SENSATION IN STEEL INQUIRY

THE COLONIAL STOCK COMPANY

NEW YORK, Aug. 2-When Judge Elbert H. Gary and Henry C. Fricker, of the United States Steel Corporation, took a midnight train from New York during the financial panic of 1907 to see President Roosevelt in Washington about the taking over of the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company by the Steel Corporation, in order to avert the crash of the brokerage firm of Moore & Schley, Grant B. Schley, one of the most interested participants in the proposed transaction, knew nothing about the White House expedition.

Mr. Schley, who was one of the organizers of the Tennessee Coal & Iron syndicate and its associated manager, today so informed the house committee in the inquiry into the affairs of the Steel Corporation, and he further surprised the committee by the admission that he could say whether or not the transfer of the Tennessee Coal & Iron stock, upon which the brokerage firm had made heavy loans, was the means of preventing the final demise of his brokerage business.

Though denying any knowledge of the existence of an alleged conspiracy on the part of J. P. Morgan & Co. and his interests of the United States Steel Corporation, or both, to discredit Tennessee Coal & Iron stock in the money market, and that the Steel Corporation could acquire the vast holdings of ore and coal in Birmingham district, Mr. Schley averred that when the transfer of Tennessee stock to the Steel Corporation was suggested in order to clear up the money situation in New York, he had pictured George W. Perkins, a member of the finance committee of the Steel Corporation, how Tennessee Coal & Iron would be of enormous value to his corporation, how its vast ore and coal holdings were in valuable and how its acquisition would enable the corporation to enter the southern steel market in a very active capacity.

"Did you urge Mr. Perkins," asked Mr. Littleton, "to advocate the sale of the property of the Steel Corporation and point out to him how valuable a property it would be?" "I told him I thought the Tennessee Company would be a very valuable property for the Steel Corporation," Mr. Schley answered. "I called his attention to its great physical advantage, its vast ore holdings and enormous undeveloped coal fields." "Now, Mr. Schley, there has been much conflicting opinion about the situation," Mr. Littleton proceeded. "Was the firm of Moore & Schley facing failure at the time of this transaction?" "The situation was serious," the witness responded. "No one could tell what the morrow would bring forth."

Here Mr. Littleton read from a letter written in November, 1907, by President Roosevelt to Attorney General Bonaparte in which he related that Judge Gary and Henry C. Frick had been to see him and told him that a prominent New York brokerage house would fall within a week unless the United Steel Corporation took over the Tennessee Coal & Iron Company, and thus come to the rescue.

"Did you know that Mr. Gary and Mr. Frick were going to tell President Roosevelt that a brokerage firm in New York was about to fail?" "I certainly did not," Mr. Schley answered. "Did you hear of a conference of bankers in New York planning to come to the rescue of Moore & Schley?"

"I knew of the conference at Mr. Morgan's house and that there was a question as to whether they were going to the rescue of the Trust Company of America or Moore & Schley first," was the answer.

"Well, are you prepared to say that the failure of Moore & Schley was prevented by the sale of the Tennessee Coal & Iron Co. stock to the Steel Corporation?" "No, I cannot say that," was Mr. Schley's answer.

In the long examination it developed that the Tennessee Coal & Iron stock was only a small portion of industrial collateral put up with other high grade stock and other industrial loans were made on the Tennessee stock alone.
