Quarrie who returned Saturday
from United States where he
delivered a carload of live foxes. He
has commenced his fur buying sea-
son and Monday's collection was one
of the finest received, particularly a
collection of exceptionally fine ship-
ments from Perry C. Weeks ranch,
Summerside. On Tuesday Mr. Dan-
iel F. Meehan from New York com-
menced his annual business buying,
and purchased over double the amount
of any previous day's purchase
in former years. Mr. Meehan will
be at Mr. MacQuarrie's office for
about two weeks and is interested
in all grades for the different coun-
tries throughout the world. That
the customers who brought in their
furs were well pleased with the
prices paid was evident by the fact
that practically everyone accepted
the prices offered. Mr. MacQuarrie
is making another shipment of a
full carload of live foxes and anticipat-
ing having a larger season's opera-
tions than heretofore.

The Markets

MONTREAL, Que., Nov. 29.
Dullness was the chief character-
istic of the export trade in grain
here today, there being practically
no demand from any source. Trading
in cash grain in the domestic
market was also slow but prices
were steady. The feature of the
four trade was the further weak-
ness that prevailed for spring
wheat grades and prices scored a
further decline of ten cents per bar-
rel. This was attributed to the fur-
ther break in Winnipeg cash wheat
prices. First patents were quoted
at \$8.10, second patents at \$7.50
and strong bakers at \$7.50 per bar-
rel. The continuation of the market
for winter wheat flour was un-
changed, prices being about steady
with a moderate amount of busi-
ness passing. The demand for all
lines of millfeed continued good
and the undertone to the market
was firm. The movement of stand-
ard grades of rolled oats was fair-
ly large and prices were maintain-
ed. Prices for all grades of fresh
and storage eggs were well main-
tained under an active demand.
The receipts were 1,614 cases. Ow-
ing to the unseasonable weather
prevailing and the limited demand
from outside sources for potatoes
a weaker feeling developed today
and prices scored a decline of five
to ten cents per bag. The volume
of business was small. Sales of odd
cars of Prince Edward Island
whites were made at \$1.20 per bag
of 90 pounds; Prince Edward Is-
land Green Mountains at \$1.25 per
bag of 90 pounds, New Brunswick
Green Mountains at \$1.15 per bag
in bulk, cobbles at \$1.10 per bag
in bulk, and Quebec varieties at 90
cents to \$1 per bag in bulk. ex-
track. The tone of the market for
imported beans was steady under
a fair demand. Sales of car lots on
spot were made at \$2.50 per bush-
el, and to arrive at \$2.50 per bush-
el, ex-track while broken lots
sold at \$2.75 per bushel, ex-store,
and the butter trade continued dull
and the undertone was easy at the
late decline noted. The receipts
were 203 packages. The demand
from local and foreign buyers for
cheese was again slow and prices
were unchanged. The receipts
were 2,108 boxes.

OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 29.—No
change is reported from Canadian
egg markets today. It is reported
from Vancouver that a carload of
Washington eggs is being delivered
from Detroit to Montreal cost-
ing 47 cents l. o. b. for mixed stand-
ard.

TORONTO.—Local situation is
unchanged. Dealers are quoting
country shippers extras 60—65,
firsts 50—54, pullet extras 46—45,
seconds 33—37. Prices of fresh to
retailers extras 70—75, firsts 60—
63, seconds 38—40, storage extras
46—47, firsts 43—44, seconds 38.
Country shippers report extremely
high production.

REGINA.—Dealers are quoting
country shippers delivered extras
45, firsts 43, seconds 39. However,
practically no fresh eggs are ar-
riving. Poultry receipts are not
yet up to last year's average.

CALGARY.—The poultry market
is active here and arrivals are
meeting a strong demand.

VANCOUVER.—There is no
change in condition and prices on
the market. Heated car shipments
are brisk and some orders are not
filled.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—Prices have
advanced under a continued scar-
city. Dealers are now paying coun-
try shippers extras 60, firsts 50,
seconds 38.

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ABEGWEIT ANNUAL MEETING
SHOW GOOD YEAR IN SPORT

The President Outlines The Years' Activi-
ties In Masterly Manner, Treasurer's Re-
port Shows The Club Clear Of Debt, Sec-
retary Reported Favorably On Athle-
tics. New President, Dr. G. L. Smith.

Last evening in the Board of
Trade rooms a large representation
of Abegweits assembled for the an-
nual meeting of the Club, which
was possibly the most successful an-
nual meeting of this club for some
years.

The President, Dr. Yeo, presiding,
called the meeting to order and
then submitted his yearly report of
the Abegweit Club which is printed
below and which should be read by
every citizen.

The president announced that
five years ago the club were in debt
to the amount of twenty-one hun-
dred dollars, but was pleased to in-
form the members that today the
club apart from the mortgage on
the grounds were entirely free of
debt, which was met by applause.

He also paid a glowing tribute
to the people of Charlottetown, claim-
ing they were the most wonderful
people in the world, ever ready to
render assistance, financially or oth-
erwise to further the interests of
athletics in Charlottetown.

The secretary, Mr. Charles
Stewart and treasurer, Mr. Byron
Brown also came in for a high
measure of praise from the presi-
dent for their untiring efforts and
business-like methods in promoting
the interests of the club. The chair-
man and members of the differ-
ent committees were also con-
gratulated by the president for the
valuable assistance during the past
year.
