The late Mr. Smith was the son of the late John Smith, who was born in March 1840, in Aberdeen, Scotland, and emigrated to this province with his parents, brother and sisters, in 1851. Mr. Smith was first engaged in farming on the North River Road, near the Queen's Arm, then on the McGill farm, and subsequently at Rocky Point. He leaves a widow nee Miss Doyle, of South Shore, and a family of seven, James in Sheet Harbor, N. S., John and Florrie (Mrs. Roste) in Boston; Ambrose and Mrs. McDougall, in Moyle, B. C.; Frank at the South Shore, and Mrs. William Dockenoff, North River. Two others and three sisters survive him, George A. Smith, of Charlottetown, and Frank of South Shore; Mrs. Cobbs, of Charlottetown; Mrs. Thos. Murphy, South Shore, and Mrs. Malcolm McKinnon, of Rocky Point. The members of the family abroad have been telegraphed to and the date of the funeral will be made known on hearing from them.
