Smiles And Tears At Local Red Cross Yesterday

With a large number of children arriving throughout the entire day from all parts of Queens and Kings County as well as from Charlottetown, the Red Cross Society continued its fourteenth year of holding semi-annual clinics for crippled children. Dr. T. B. Acker of Halifax, the orthopedic surgeon who has conducted the clinics since their inception and has done such inestimable work in relieving the physical disabilities of so many Island children, had a very long and strenuous day in giving a careful examination to the 71 patients attending the Charlottetown clinic. Earlier in the week Dr. Acker held a three day clinic in Summerside.

Happy were the children who were told the good news that they could discard crutches, braces, plaster casts or special apparatus which they had been using over long periods of time.—one little girl of eight had been in plaster for six years. Many others were delighted with encouraging reports of good progress because they co-operated faithfully with the treatment outlined.

There were also some sad cases of children whose parents had despaired of improvement of their children when lameness, spinal curvatures, etc., were first noticed and so deformities had progressed to such an advanced stage that very little hope of improvement could be given. It was therefore discouraging for the Red Cross workers to have children four years of age and over brought in with conditions that should have been under treatment several years ago, when they have stressed the importance of early treatment for so many years.

The x-ray departments of the hospitals and Dr. Creelman at the Sanatorium were most co-operative in attending to patients referred to them. Miss Rose Longworth very kindly placed her chauffeur at the disposal of the Red Cross for the day to transport the little patients to and from the clinic, to the hospitals and trains.
