TEACHERS' CONVENTION

The public meeting in the evening was a success in point of numbers and otherwise. His Honor the Lieutenant Governor presided and introduced as the first speaker Premier Farquhar who contrasted the teaching profession of half a century ago with that of today and enlarged on the privileges which we have that were denied to those who came before us. He contended that part of the college curriculum was of no use to a majority of our students and that it should be modified and made more practical.

He and his colleagues were prepared to have subjects such as stenography taught if the teachers so desired. He enlarged on the benefits of this study and quoted authorities to show that it was one of the most useful both for practical value and also mental development. The speaker closed with an eloquent plea for our young men to remain at home and assist in building up our land and making it still more prosperous.

The audience were then favored with readings from Misses James, Davies and McKenzie. Violin solo by Prof. Grant. All of which were encored.

Prof. M. Leod then spoke commending the offer made by the Premier and also eulogised the art of shorthand. He however did not approve of altogether abolishing the dead languages as they had their use in developing the mind in the same way that gymnastics although of no practical value tends to develop the muscular powers.

He also advised the teacher regarding the assignment of home work. We have too much on our curriculum at the present time. The professional men of a decade ago will compare favorably with those of today because in the schools which those men attended more individual work was done and the teacher did not do so much teaching.

He advised short lessons so as not to be distasteful to the pupils and would also impress thoroughness on all scholars.

Miss Davies again favored the audience with another reading which delighted the audience after which the national anthem was sung and the meeting closed.
