ELECTRIC LIGHTS. On Saturday night, December 1, for the first time in the history of Georgetown its streets were well lighted by electricity. When the Town Council some nine months ago arranged with the Montague Electric Light Co. to receive its power from the plant of that company it was thought that Georgetown would receive its light in October. However more efficient machinery such as a new dynamo and water wheel had to be procured. Before power enough could be raised to light Georgetown, last week this machinery arrived and was installed on Saturday night, Dec. 1st, according to contract the streets were lighted for the first time, although a trial light has been lighting a portion of Water St. for the past six weeks. The staff under the direction of Mr. Clements has accomplished a wonder. An amount of work in the last month in the wiring of the different houses and other buildings of the town there being now about 215 lights now wired as well as there being twenty street lights installed which lightless the Town wonderful. The Town Council deserve great credit for a splendid system of lighting which they were instrumental in establishing.—G.

Soldiers Not Looking For Peace

Miss Margaret Shephard, Bear River, received the following letter from a friend at the front. Somewhere in Belgium, Oct. 9th, 1917.

Dear Friend:— Your very welcome letter of Oct. 8th and as usual was very pleased to hear from you and to learn that all are well at home. I told you about our move to Belgium and what a rotten place it is. We have now been here about two weeks and I am getting a worse opinion of the place every day. However I am thankful to be living and in good health. We do not expect to be here very long and I hope not. We moved forward to a new position a few days ago. We went from the frying pan into the fire. I just came in from there this morning after doing 24 hours on the front. We had a pretty hard night of it. We were firing all night and it was raining and very cold. So you see it is not all sunshine out here. Yes it would be great if we could be home for Christmas. But there is no hope. I fear we are in for another winter, although there is much talk of peace, before the New Year. I find the most of the Peace talk finds its source in England and not out here among the fighting troops. Well Margaret I have written you enough for one mail so I guess I will get to bed and try and get some sleep. Will write you about Paris leave later on. Must close for this time hoping to hear from you soon again. I remain your Friend, 92792 J. E. McISAAC.

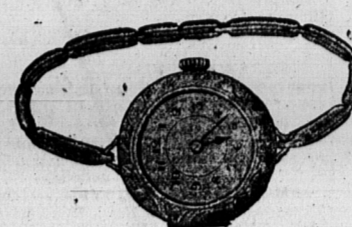

MATHEWSON AND MCGRAW SPARRING

Manager Christy Mathewson, of Cincinnati, has jumped into the baseball market in opposition to Manager McGraw in an effort to land Al Mamaux, the Private pitcher who is now under suspension by the Pittsburgh Club. Mattay has already made offers for the start twiler, although Manager McGraw started plans to get him just as soon as he appeared to have trouble with Manager Buzdeck last season. Mathewson has always been a great admirer of Mamaux, who has one of the easiest and most natural styles of any pitcher in the league. President Barney Dreyfuss, of Pittsburgh, has been McGraw and Mathewson little encouragement about Mamaux and it is believed that after the severe taste of discipline he had last year he may come back to the Pirates, ready to follow the club's training rules next spring.

LONDON, Dec. 3.—If the six million British women who will benefit by the extension of the franchise to women under the provisions of the representation of the people bill fail to use their opportunities it will not be the fault of the women's societies of the country. Practically every society catering for women from the trade union to the National Council of Women, is considering the possibility of organizing women politically in the interest of their several projects. The National Council, a federation of women's societies with a membership through affiliated societies of more than 2,500,000, through its branch known as the National Union of Women Workers will attempt to bring before all women the need to use their votes in the interest of national reforms. The National Federation of Women Workers, which numbers 40,000 members, has decided by a 4,000 majority to affiliate with the Labor party. This affiliation gives the right to run a candidate for Parliament who will have the support of the Labor party and the benefits of its organization.

A Cry from the Grave

The following letter was received a few days ago by Major F. B. McRae. The writer of the letter was S. E. Chandler who left here with 32nd draft for Valcartier in August 1914, accompanying Major McRae to Valcartier where later he was transferred to the 13th Battalion. He left for England with the first Expeditionary Force and went to France with the First Division. He was wounded at the Second Battle of Ypres and was sent back to England where he was treated in a hospital. Recovering, he was drafted to the 42nd Battalion with which he served until killed on November 3rd this year.

His letter to Major McRae, dated France, October 18th, claiming that after his long service and having been twice wounded, he might be permitted to return home is most pathetic in view of the fact that he was killed in action a few days afterwards. What a commentary this is on the political vapourings of the little men in Charlottetown who say there is no need of more men, that there are men enough now in England and France! Following is the letter: 42 Battalion, Royal Highlanders, of Canada.

Major F. B. McRae, Dear Fred:— Just a line to let you know that I am O.K., hoping this scroll will find you the same. Well F. B. I've had you since October 9, 1915 but the First Contingent boys are having their names taken for Canadian leave. As I am the only one in the 42nd Battalion for this leave, ten chances to one I will be overlooked. If you see your way clear to take steps towards helping me I will be much obliged. I landed in France with the 13th R. H. of Canada and I don't see any reason why I should
