MAN LOOTS HOTEL

TORONTO, Dec. 20—The jury in the case of the man who looted a hotel in Toronto, Ontario, on Monday night, found the man guilty of the crime.

MOB OF MEN ATTACKED STREET CARS.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 20—A mob of men from the C. P. R. shops attacked twelve special street cars, sent down to the shops at their request today, and smashed every bit of glass in the cars. The crews locked the doors and got under the seats and the police arrived and dispersed the mob, after using their batons and making four arrests. Several strike breakers were out about the face, but their injuries are not serious. Eighty cars have been running all day, and strike-breakers are pouring into the city. The men are still confident of winning.

HE STUMBLER OVER HIS FATHER'S BODY.
NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 20—Ambrose Wilson, a young Jersey business man, returned to his boarding house on Johnson Avenue, early today, after a belated evening visit with friends, and tumbled head first into the body of his father in the hallway. The old man's body was cold, and he had been dead apparently for some hours. Examination showed that he had been terribly beaten with some heavy implement, and finally killed by the jugular vein. The police, after a hurried examination, arrested August Miller and his wife, joint owners of the house. The two Wilsons, father and son, had boarded there for several years. The boarder lodged a charge of murder against Miller, and directed that his wife be held as a witness.

H. X. PRESBYTERY VOTES FOR UNION.
HALIFAX, Dec. 20—The Presbytery of Halifax spent all of today in discussion of a resolution moved by President Forrest of Dalhousie University, that the Presbytery approve of the basis of union between the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches and that the union itself be approved. The resolution, carried by a vote of twenty to three, but the Moderator, Rev. Robert Johnston, of Halifax, asked that he be recorded as opposed to the resolution. Those who voted for the resolution included Principal McKinstry of the Presbyterian College and all of the professors of that institution. Several members refrained from voting at all.

made lengthwise, the band is laid along the crease so that half its width is on either side of the crease, and one end flush with the end piece of sateen. The band is then divided into twelve sections, each just wide enough for a knife blade, and each section is stitched to the pieces of sateen underneath. The other end of the band is turned under and also stitched. The sateen with the band applied is now placed over the piece of cretonne so that all the edges come together. These are bound with a strip of sateen. The sides are turned up and ribbon ties fastened to the outer ends, which are varied around the roll. This case, by varying the size can be made for spoons, forks or dessert knives.

A HEALTH LEAGUE OF 10,000 CONTAGIOUSLY WELL.

The Y. M. C. A., which now guides more than 245,000 men and boys in their physical exercise and in their play activities, and gives them counsel in reference to the regulation of their physical habits, now proposes to enlist at least 10,000 young men as lay missionaries in a service of health to others. It will give scientific health instruction in the gymnasiums. Already 3,450 volunteers are serving on its leaders' corps under the 500 employed physical directors. With an organized and instructed force of volunteers many times the number of enrolled membership of 245,000 young men and boys can be reached with the message of right living, and it is proposed that every one of the 500,000 members of the association in the city and in rural communities, in shops and factories, may gain a zest for health and such education and training in right living, eating, drinking, sleeping habits and exercise that shall make them living exponents, advocates and teachers of health. The latent power in the Association is to be made a power in action.

It is claimed that the greatest need in North America in reference to health education is for popular education and popular initiative. The present available knowledge of health laws and sanitation, if made general, will reduce sickness from 30 per cent. to 65 per cent. There is nothing so open to great reduction, or so possible of great reduction, as disease, most of which is preventable. There is surely no battle so worthy of the warring as the battle against ill health, inefficiency and physical degeneration.

The recent International Y. M. C. A. convention at Toronto has, by resolution, approved the league suggested by the National Physical Directors' Society. The International Y. M. C. A. physical department has been asked to take the lead in launching it and to organize an advisory committee of fifty, made up of men from each State and Province in North America. The league will be launched when 10,000 men are enrolled from the Association's membership. Each member of this new league will receive, on joining, and on the payment of his fee of \$1, a monthly bulletin on health education and health service. He will receive in addition three books, (1) Making Life Worth While, by Herbert W. Fisher, publisher's price, \$1.32, postpaid; (2) Eugenics, a small scientific book, by Davenport, publisher's price, 54 cents; (3) National Vitality, a study of national conservation (originally sold

PROWSE BROS PRIZE CONTEST CLOSED YESTERDAY

Decision Made By City Editors—Over Two Thousand Letters

The interest evidenced in the change of business which Prowse Bros. are instituting the first of the year—has been almost beyond expectation, and the contest closed yesterday. Some excellent letters were received—and something over two thousand were ready for inspection when the hour for decision arrived. The number of the best ones even was exceptional—and at the hour of deciding the gentlemen chosen to award the prizes had some hard work to do. J. E. B. McCready, W. L. Cotton and F. J. Nash, the editors of the three dailies, along with Prowse Bros.' advertising manager, were the only ones present—and the three gentlemen made the decision. Pamphlets will be issued upon special topics, such as sleep, diet, exercise and intemperance written in a popular language, yet on a scientific basis. Lantern slides, with lectures, will be furnished on alcohol, tuberculosis, posture and other subjects, in co-operation with other societies. There will be literature, lectures and slides and instruction available on shop, child and sex hygiene, on playgrounds, swimming and life-saving, and such subjects as the conditions in varying cities and sections demand. The league will be ready to advise its health chapters in all sorts of community efforts in the promoting of health. Special studies will be prepared for men who are familiar with diseases most prevalent in the rural districts in North America, for those engaged in the instruction of groups of immigrants or foreigners engaged in coal-mining communities, in quarry-

ing, in construction camps and foreign colonies of the cities to which the Association has recently gained access in large numbers by their teaching of the English language. In this the teaching will be very largely from lantern slides, made from pictures illustrating conditions in accidents and diseases, and by this means the danger lurking in impure drinking water and germ infections can be shown. Geo. J. Fisher, M. D., 124 E. Twenty-Eighth Street, New York, secretary of the Physical Department of the International Convention of the Y. M. C. A., is the mover and secretary of the movement.
