

Saints Tied With Legion For City League Lead

Kane-Coached Squad Skate To Convincing 10-4 Win Over Navy

Outlasting and outplaying their opponents most of the way, Jackie Kane's St. Dunstan's University hockey squad last night vaulted to first place in the City League when they defeated Walter Lawlor's Navy squad 10-4 before a fair-sized crowd of chilled fans who braved the sub-zero temperature to witness the encounter.

Tired after being held in Souris over 18 hours after playing an exhibition game there last night, the Navy squad never hit their real stride all through the tussle, as the Saints continually outplayed them. In flashes the "Tars" would come within one goal of their opponents after yielding the leads but the superiority of the Saints asserted itself in the final stages.

Saints jumped into a 3-0 lead in the early stages of the game with the Navy making it 3-1 before the second period was over. Once during the second period they were within a goal of their opponents but at the end were trailing 8-4 and Saints completed their league-topping effort by shooting the only two goals of the final period to earn their 6-goal margin.

Davies Sensational

But although beaten ten times during the game goalie Johnny Davies of the Navy was one of the outstanding figures of the game. Time and again he made sensational saves and four times robbed Carl McDonald of goals as the S.D.U. spearhead skated right in on top of him.

With a big margin in play in the first fifteen minutes of the opening period Saints rang up a 3-0 lead as they continually skated in close to pepper Davies and it was not until a goal-minding tip kept the score to that figure.

The game was only 34 seconds old when Saints opened the scoring, Blanchard after carrying over the line taking Carl McDonald's return to beat Davies cleanly.

Three minutes later Davies had made three great saves Saints countered again. Rodgers slung a pass from outside the crease. For the next eight minutes Saints kept hammering away but could not make the red light blink despite having a man advantage due to two penalties to McGregor. But Davies' armour was pierced for the third time as Thibault slid the disc under Davies' falling body from D'Amours.

Starting to show their best form Navy in the last five minutes hemmed the Saints in with their healthy margin but Prince of Wales took the lead in the second session; they knotted the count with only seconds remaining and then took charge of the play in overtime to walk off the floor with a well-deserved victory.

Black Hawks Hand Detroit 6-4 Defeat

DETROIT, Jan. 9.—(AP)—Blasting in three big goals within a 56-second span in the opening period, the cellar-dwelling Chicago Black Hawks hung on to beat Detroit Red Wings 6-4 tonight in a National Hockey League scrap before 10,493 fans.

Actually the Black Hawks counted four times within less than two minutes during the opening stanza virtually to sew up the verdict by the time the game had gone 11 minutes.

After Detroit had counted first when defenceman Jack Johnson of the Hawks accidentally deflected the puck into the Chicago cage with his hands, the Black Hawks came roaring back.

Alex Kalela punched in Red Hamill's rebound at the 9:09 mark to tie the score and the Red Wings lost forward Ted Lindsay less than a minute later on a hooking penalty.

While Lindsay was in the box Max Bentley drove a long shot from left forward to beat Detroit Red Harry Lumley at 10:04. Bill Mostienko skated around the defence to score from the corner of the cage at 10:16 and Adam Brown punched a 10-foot shot under Lumley at 11:00.
