THE STATION SITE.

Str.—I am glad to see your strong advocacy of the new station where the great bulk of the citizens want it at foot of Great George Street. I hear the latest reason, or rather excuse by those who seem to have the ear of the Government, is that there are engineering difficulties in the way. It seems absurd to me, coming from men who have crossed the Rocky Mountains and Cascades and all the other mountains and rivers between the Atlantic and Pacific Oceans with railroads and they are going to do it again. Talk of engineering difficulties between Prince and Great George Street that cannot be overcome! Why is seems ridiculous. If I remember this was the same excuse why the Hillsborough Bridge was built in the wrong place against the wish of the citizens, and it has actually come to pass that the engineering difficulties were greater in the present site than in the lower and more convenient one.

It is said by the knowing ones that if we do not accept a new station in the East Bog we will not get it at all. That seems to be rather strange talk to the citizens of our capital and Province.

The Government seems to have millions of money to build railroads in the west for the benefit of Galicians, Doukobors and the scum or Europe, but huddle a great while over the cost of a new station where the citizens ask for it here in the East.

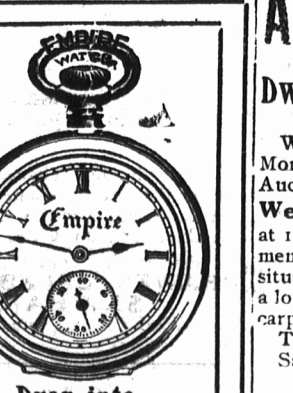
