P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage Reports

Following is the report of Mr. W. A. Stewart, chairman of the Trustee Board, submitted at Friday night's annual meeting of the Trustee Board of the P. E. I. Protestant Orphanage:

"The years pass quickly and in many cases are as quickly forgotten. 1946, with the war ended, did not produce that peace and return to industry, promised; instead it was a continuous series of strikes arising from differences between labor and management starvation and hardships in ravaged countries was most disquieting while victorious nations, seeking advantage, quarrelled over zones of influence.

"Truly we are in dire need of some neilsman who can pilot a troubled world into a harbor of goodwill.

"Our Orphanage work has been carried on very successfully through this unsettled period and all who have assisted in the care of our needy children will be happy to know that this year was one of the best in our long history.

"All committees worked faithfully, freely and at top speed throughout and it was my great pleasure to be associated with such an energetic and unselfish group. The School, under a very capable teacher, has done excellent work as evidenced by the Inspector's Report which follows, and we are much indebted to the Royal Arch Masons for their continued interest and attention to all necessary supplies. The new fluorescent lights they installed are a great improvement.

"The Property Committee has had much necessary repair work on our building and more will have to be undertaken this coming year. The Property, on the whole, is in satisfactory condition. It was impossible to secure a contractor to make suggested changes to and from the basement.

"Two new sections had to be ordered, what is known as the new boiler, now over fifteen years in service. The old boiler, which has been in use since the building was erected, also began to leak badly in several places and cannot now be used. A new boiler has been ordered, as well as three sections for the so-called, new boiler. This will complete again the two boiler system, which, it is hoped, will look after the heating requirements for many years to come.

Increase in Admissions

"Mr. MacPherson, under the direction of Miss Beers, has kept the grounds and gardens in good condition and state of production. The uppermost thought in the mind of the trustees of this institution was protection and care of neglected and orphaned children and it still continues as the real purpose of the Home. This year 1946 twenty-six children were admitted as compared with nineteen in 1945; eleven were returned to parents as against eight in 1944 and three were adopted into new homes. The large number of broken homes accounts for the difference in admissions for the year. In 1945 there was a much larger call for teen-age boys to help on farms; for this year no such application was received at all.

"The problems of this committee are manifold in every case the best interest of the child is the first consideration. It is indeed very gratifying to have so many of those who found a home and are now on their own, returning to visit and thank us.

"The Buying Committee has had to do much scouting in order to obtain necessary goods at the most reasonable price. They have been most careful in their selection and our expenses have been kept well in hand.

very successful year, perhaps the best in our long history, the committee under the efficient generalship of Mrs. H. S. Henderson, a veteran of over twenty campaigns, has never failed to bring success; we are deeply indebted to her and her committee for long and untiring service. The full details of their successful year are all clearly shown elsewhere and well deserve your careful study.

"Our Endowment Fund was considerably increased during the year as shown in the statements. All investments received are placed in this fund and invested in Trust Investments; the interest only is used for current expenses. We were able to purchase \$9,000.00 new bonds this year which included \$4,000.00 from Maintenance Account. This fund is steadily growing and we look upon it as a safeguard of the future.

"The Home Committee has closed a busy year; the building itself has been kept in apple-pie order at all times and many visitors expressed their pleasure with the overall appearance. There were many outings and treats provided for the children, in all of which the staff freely co-operated. The old car was exchanged for a quiet, roomy accommodation and it pleased all members of the staff were well remembered.

"In such a brief summary of our work it is scarcely possible to do justice to the many scores of helpers and well wishers, who quietly and in their own way, give us un-failing support. Public confidence is one of our best assets and while the future will continue bright but we must ever remain worthy of that confidence.

"And now about our Ladies' Auxiliaries. Have you visited the Orphanage on their Annual Meeting Day? There you do and the reactions they represent. They are our most outstanding service unit and to them must be given the credit for the successes of many years. In addition to this band of willing and enthusiastic workers there are numerous sympathetic friends and societies but in this brief summary only a few can be mentioned here, such as: Dr. Tidmarsh; Dr. Lantz; Dr. Wray; Grand Lodge L. O. B. A.; Queen Mary Needlework Guild; Children's Aid Society; The Gyro; Royal Arch Masons; Good Neighbors Mt. Herbert and Vicinity; Women's Institutes; Trai Ringers and Girls' Guides; Orange Ass. Fraternities; Masons; Orange Ass. Sociations; B. I. S.; L. P. U. Calcedonia Club; Salvation Army; Churches and Clergy; The Press; Milk Charitotown and Summerside. The whole work of the year has been carried on with the greatest co-operation and harmony and I must express my grateful thanks to all members of the trustee board, who attended all meetings so faithfully and put their very best thought into the work of protecting the unprotected or orphaned child.

"The long and faithful work of the secretary of the board also must receive my special thanks and appreciation."

MEDICAL REPORT

Submitted by Dr. F. W. Tidmarsh: "There were twenty-eight physical examinations made in 1946 on children previous to admission. One child was rejected because of mental deficiency. Two were found to be suffering from rickets but improved rapidly with proper diet and vitamins. Another child was admitted with bronchial asthma but it was not considered severe enough to cause rejection. However, it still requires special attention.

"Dr. Houston removed diseased tonsils and adenoids in one child. Dr. Lantz prescribed glasses for the polio after examination. During the poliomyelitis epidemic quarantine was rigidly enforced and no cases developed among the children in the institution.

"There were no cases of acute illness and as usual, no deaths. Dr. Wray attended to the dental needs of the children. Through the kindness of 'The Gyros', five boys attended the Y. M. C. A. Summer Camp for five days. "In spite of many difficulties and acute shortages Miss Beers and her staff have maintained the high standard of feeding and care that has been customary in the past."

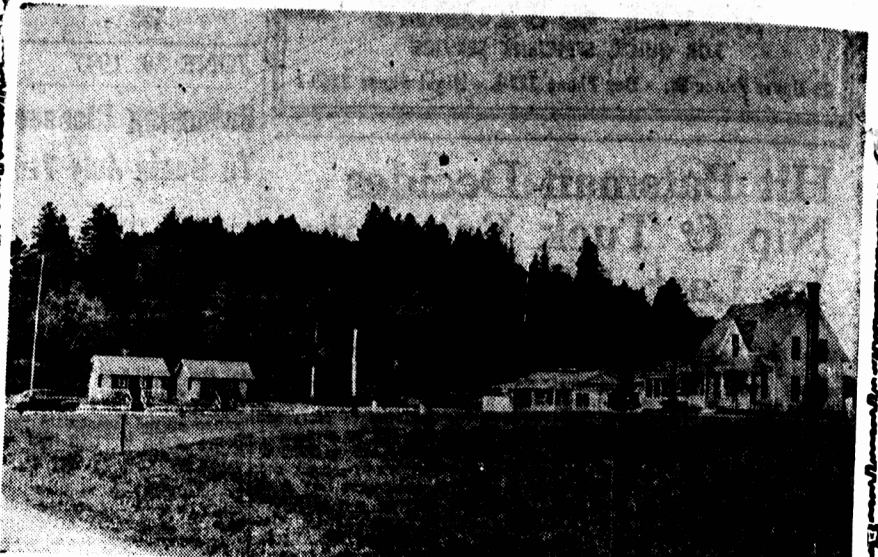
