Kissing Wife of Another is No Crime

CHICAGO, June 29—It is not necessarily a crime for a man to kiss a married woman. Judge David said in the Superior Court, in commenting on the dismissal of the \$50,000 alienation of affections suit of Abbott versus Early. William C. Abbott, through his attorney, J. C. McGroom, started suit against Dr. W. F. Early, a dentist, charging him with alienating the affections of Mrs. Blanche Abbott. Mr. Abbott testified that on one occasion December, 1922, Dr. Early sat on the lap of his wife and kissed her while they were visiting her mother's home. He aside from the fact that it is no crime to kiss a married woman, Judge David pointed out that Mr. Abbott had already lost the affections which he alleges were stolen from him. He informed the plaintiff that Mrs. Abbott, in securing a divorce from him in July, 1923, charged her husband with cruelty that dated back farther than the kissing incident which he cited. No settlement between the two men was announced.

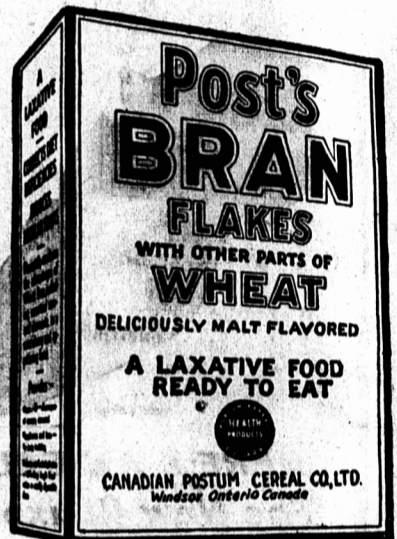
