"Fair Play" in the Examiner of Saturday jocularly calls attention to the omission of the names of certain editors from Prof. McMillan's list of Canadian poets. But "Fair Play" was himself guilty of a much graver omission. He ought to have mentioned that in the estimation of sundry brothers of the pen the editor of the Examiner is "also a great poet." Has "Fair Play" forgotten the thrilling "Romance of the Saladin, a Poetical Drama," by W. L. Cotton? Not to know this argues Fair Play himself unknown. Saul also was among the prophets; Cotton among the poets. His eye has rolled in the fine frenzy of poetic inspiration, glancing from Heaven to earth from earth to Heaven. We know not at what moment another poetical drama may burst forth from the Examiner's sanctum. When it comes it will receive the warmest and most cordial literary hospitality.

We regret to find the Pioneer taking very narrow ground in regard to the proposed permission to utilize a room in the Colonial Building for the Public Library, and the Historical and Antiquarian Societies. At Ottawa, Halifax, Fredericton and many other capitals the like is done. The objects of the Historical Society, and the Natural History and Antiquarian are provincial rather than local. The Library will be of great use and advantage to members of the Legislature and the College students, who come from all parts of the Island. Moreover already the promoters of the Library movement are devising means by which when the Library is established it may be of utility to all in whatever part of the Island they may reside, who may desire to avail themselves of its privileges. The Pioneer's constituents could be benefited in no possible way were the proposed dog-in-the-manger policy carried out.

Dewet has signally failed in his second attempt to invade Cape Colony, and appears to have suffered a more disastrous defeat than any which had before befallen him. His losses in killed, wounded, prisoners, guns and transport animals were terrible and must prove paralyzing. Three hundred Boers were taken prisoners or surrendered, 22 known to be killed or wounded, one fifteen pounder gun, 462 rifles, 3,500 horses, 3,530 draft oxen, 18,700 cattle, 55,400 sheep, and 1000 wagons and carts were captured by the British during the recent operations. Dewet himself had a narrow escape from capture and his forces have been scattered. They have, however, hitherto shown a remarkable faculty of getting together again.

The important but rather discouraging announcement is made that the judges to whom the Manitoba Prohibition Act was referred, have decided against its constitutionality. They find that it encroaches upon matters especially assigned to the Dominion Parliament and conflicts with the British North America Act. It is declared to be beyond the power of the Legislature to enact. We are without further particulars of the judgment, and cannot therefore say whether or not any similar weakness can be found in our own prohibitory law.

ACETYLENE—THE PEOPLE'S GAS.

Light and heat are two subjects that enter very largely into the expenses of business men, in their homes, and in their work-shops. Not only is the light more brilliant, soft and beautiful than ordinary coal gas, but it is far cheaper. In fact the cost is no greater than paraffine after the gas-making machine is introduced in the house or store.

That it is more satisfactory, gives a better light at less money is evidenced by the fact that progressive and shrewd merchants in large cities are introducing this gas, taking out the meters and disconnecting from the city gas.—Fredericton Reporter.
