show contamination, the only safe thing to do with them is fishing them and transplanting. They then, the order to stop fishing will be all right, and clear, before they are grown up, and the big ones will be all right in a year. I brought American oysters here twenty years ago or more and planted them, and they were still American oysters after being six months in the water. They had the same coppery, metallic taste. They will not change in a short time, but they will if left long enough. The resolution was then agreed to.

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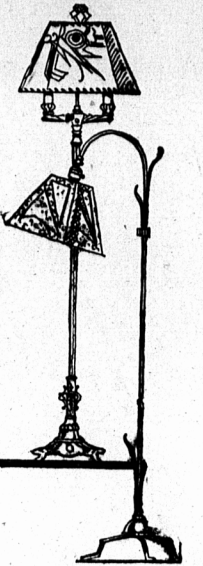
