All this actual and potential wealth they confidently entrusted to Ontario and Quebec, for that was the substance of the bargain. Little they realized how grasping and how unconsciously tyrannical a majority can be.

Contrast these conditions with those of Quebec, Ontario and the new Provinces beyond the Lakes. Each of the latter has now more people than Nova Scotia, the most populous of the Maritimes, and each of them occupies a territorial area five times as great as the three Maritimes taken together.

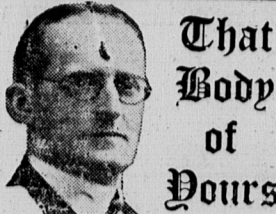
Are these things to go on for another fifty years? That is a thought that is now vexing the souls of thousands in the Maritimes and it does not tend to optimism.
