Sad Accident At Hebron

The entire community at Hebron and Brae were greatly shocked when the news was spread over the rural telephone of the sad accident which occurred at the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. Angus Clements, Hebron, Lot 8, his son, Mr. Charles Clements, being the victim, a young man 22 years of age and a universal favorite. "Charlie" was a young man of excellent character, being most industrious and virtually taking entire charge of the homestead. On Friday last the family dined together and shortly after the father left to help dig the grave of a neighbor. Mr. Daniel McKinnon and Charlie's last words to his father, were "You go and help I will fix up the stable and then put in the wood." Half an hour elapsed and his mother becoming uneasy sent his little sister to see if anything was amiss. She ran back and said that Charlie was lying down in the stable behind one of the horses. His mother ran to the barn, saw his condition and ran to a neighbor's home for help, and also to summon a doctor, who arrived quickly. Neighbors gathered quickly and removed the young man to the house, where he remained unconscious until passing away, in about an hour. It was quite evident that he had been fixing the stable floor behind the horses when one of them kicked him in the temple. It is supposed what he was stooping at the time as he had a small piece of scantling beside him when found. There are left to mourn besides the father and mother, two sisters, both trained nurses in Brookline, Mass., Miss Vera and Miss Sophia, who arrived home Tuesday. Three small sisters and one brother, aged nine, at home, to whom is extended most sincere sympathy in this sad and sudden loss of a worthy son.

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Canadian Pacific New Train Service

The new all sleeping car trains on a fast schedule to take care of the holiday traffic between Winnipeg, Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal which was established by the Canadian Pacific Railway on December 4th are proving very popular.

Business men find it a great time saver, as they only lose one day on the journey between Montreal, Ottawa, or Toronto to Winnipeg—in fact, by leaving as far East as Quebec at 1.30 in the afternoon they are in Winnipeg the second morning at 9.00 a. m. ready for business.

In addition to the new trains which make the trip between Montreal and Winnipeg in 39 hours and 45 minutes, the Canadian Pacific are maintaining the regular trains carrying mail, express, coach and tourist passengers to serve intermediate stations, as heretofore.

Shipments via the Dominion Express Company will be delivered immediately upon arrival of the train the second morning.

An excellent service is also offered on this train, which provides parlor car between Montreal and Ottawa for local travel between these two points, the schedules being reduced to two hours and twenty minutes.

These new trains are known as 95 and 56 between Toronto and Sudbury, and 97 and 98 between Montreal and Winnipeg.

Exhibits Profitable To Honey Producers

NEW WESTMINSTER, Dec. 11.—Messrs. J. W. Winson, Huntingdon, and W. H. Turnbull were chosen respectively president and secretary-treasurer of the B.C. Honey Producers here Friday afternoon. Hon. E. W. Barrow, minister of agriculture, and Dr. Wainock, Victoria, were named honorary president and vice-presidents. Mr. F. W. White, St. Nicholas, is vice-president.

Room for the development of the honey industry of this province was emphasized.

The very effective advertising resulting from the Provincial Exhibition proved to the producers that there is an increased demand for B. C. honey.

Several large wholesalers made offers which would have taken much more money than was present in the exhibition, it was stated.

The exhibition committee was charged with a strong resolution to obtain more space. The honey producers claim the whole wing of which they have hitherto taken only a portion. Complimentary comments were received from the minister of agriculture on the value and attractiveness of the 1924 display and its effect on honey production.

The members of the association were gratified by the progress made in their organization and the industry in general. The great necessity was recognized of local sales. The small producer was recommended to sell his honey near home at retail prices, leaving the larger producer free to meet the wholesale market.

In the election of officers for the ensuing year the principal officials were re-elected. The Hon. E. D. Barrow, minister of agriculture, was chosen hon. president. A microscope has been purchased by the association for the diagnosis of bee diseases and is used by the assistant provincial apiarist at the New Westminster office.

The best methods of marketing their product was the chief topic of discussion at the meeting.

Troops Will

And torrential rains have added to the discomfort of Spain. The retreat is slowing through a morass of sticky, slippery clay, mules falling and dying beside the trail. Cursing troops slogging under tumbrel, fighting, marching, and then fighting and marching again.

For a fortnight the main body of the armies of Spain have been mobilized around Zoco Abaa, enduring as the soldiers describe it, "the horrors of perdition."

It rained and rained. Wet, sultry, cursing men tramped guard posts and cared little if the wasp-like Moors descended on them.

Then Saturday the sun came out, drying the roads with an upper crust which layered mud with the deceptive thinness of the top of a well-browned pumpkin pie. And the retreat was on.

Primo Rivera, a firm determined man, planned his withdrawal well. Small contingents, protected by airplanes, started down the mountain trail.

The great planes rolled overhead their motors growing to a screech of sound as they darted from hillside to hillside to bomb the groups of Moorish guerrillas constantly harassing the march.

The United Press correspondent was permitted to witness the withdrawal from a point ten miles south of Tetuan, the focal point of the withdrawal from Zoco Abaa, which is only twelve miles further south.

But it is twelve miles of hell, as a young officer said profanely—twelve miles of burning, twisting, jagged mountain trail—twelve miles of fighting at which scores of tons of supplies, thousands of men, huge guns, herds of livestock and all the litter that goes with an army on the move must be transported with order and precision.

A twelve mile test of the ability of the military directorate of Madrid which seized power in the bloodless revolution to liquidate this Moroccan disaster—the disaster of trying to hold an impossible land against a bitter, determined foe.

It will be days before the withdrawal to Ben Karrieh can be completed. Meantime it is an everlasting credit to the Spanish command and the dogged bravery of the men of Spain.

Primo Rivera is confident, however. "We will succeed," he says, "the withdrawal will be completed within a few days."

said, "and my place is on the firing line." And my Superior kissed me and gave me his blessing. On crazy trains without mobilization orders (I was a reformer) and without military booklet, I followed the guns to Verdun. On August 20, at dawn, before the renewal of fighting, I went out to look for the wounded of the 115th and advanced beyond the outpost when, suddenly, I was surrounded by the cracking of 20 rifles; and I saw my comrade stretched, full-length, on the ground beside me, with his head crushed. The German post was thirty steps away. I felt at that moment that my heart was protecting my whole country.

Never did I breathe the air of France with such pride nor tread her soil with such assurance. I do not understand how I was not killed at that time nor twenty times since. I was thrice wounded. I still have in my body a fragment of shell received in the Somme. . . and after being demobilized I committed the crime of staying at home. . . And now you show me the door!

You must be joking, M. Herriot. But one does not joke over these things.

Never, during fifty months, did you come to seek me out either at Tracy-le-Cail, or at the Fort of Vaux, or at Tahure. I did not see you anywhere talking about your laws on religious orders" and yet you dare to produce them to-day!

Can you think of such a thing?

Neither I nor any other man, nor any woman will take the road to Belgium again. Never! You may do as you please, you may take our houses, you may open your prisons—there are many places in them left empty by those whom you know—so be it. But leave as we did in 1902? Never.

Not Afraid of Political Slackers.

To-day we have more blood in our veins, and then, you see, as soldiers of Verdun we were in the right place to learn how to hold our ground! We were not afraid of bullets or gas or the bravest soldiers of the Guard. We shall not be afraid of political slackers.

And now I shall tell you why we shall not leave. Disposition does not frighten us. We own neither roof nor field. Jesus Christ, awaits us everywhere and suffices unto the end of the world.

But we shall not leave because we do not want a Belgian, or an Englishman, or an American or a Chinaman or a German, to meet us far from home some day and ask us certain questions to which we would be forced to reply with down cast head: "France has driven us out."

For the honour of France—do you understand this word as I do?—for the honour of France we shall never again say such a thing to a foreigner. Therefore, we shall stay, every one of us. We swear it on the graves of our dead.
