TAKING STEPS TO COMBAT COMMUNISTS

Home Secretary Decides in Favor of Rapid Recruitment of Special Constabulary.

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The Daily Mail says that the Home Secretary Sir William Joynson-Hicks, has decided in favor of the rapid recruitment of special constabulary to safeguard the public against the unrest fostered by Communists. The Mail asserts that Socialist and Communist extremists are ceaselessly preparing for the struggle they wish to precipitate, either when the time comes to give effect to the recommendations of the Coal Commission or early, should trouble develop in the railways. The paper declares that John Wheatley, who was Health Minister in Ramsay MacDonald's government, is founding at Glasgow a "Workers' Defence Corps" which he hopes will achieve a membership of ten million men ready to fight against attacks on their standards of living, and that he is organizing every labor organization in the country to obtain pledges from members in this class war, which says the Mail, exists only in the minds of Communists. It is recalled that during the recent coal trouble, the creation of special constabulary was reported and later denied.

PROTESTS PLEA FOR BRITISH MINERS

Good Employment Prospects Denied—Besco Held Unable to Guarantee Steady Work.

OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—"A chance for miners: Experienced men wanted in Canada," is the headline on a news item which appeared in the issue of the Liverpool (England) Daily Post and Mercury of Aug. 3, a clipping from which has just been received by Tom Moore, President of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada. Mr. Moore complained strongly today of the article as an illustration of the false and misleading information which, he asserts, is being given in the Old Country in the Liverpool Daily Post and Mercury in need of miners" according to Mr. S. J. Rohan, an authority on Canadian coal. In an interview with a Daily Post representative on the Cunard liner Aurania, which arrived at Liverpool from Quebec on Saturday.

Situation in Canada.

"The situation of the coal industry in Canada," said Major Rohan, "is rendered difficult inasmuch as the Dominion is dependent entirely for the supply of anthracite upon the United States of America. Canada possesses 17 per cent. of the world's total coal reserves, but this notwithstanding she pays out annually to the U. S. A. \$25,000,000 for coal. We feel the only way to solve this problem is by low temperature carbonization which would enable Canada to be supplied from her own resources. Experienced coal miners are needed in Canada. There is a wonderful opportunity for thousands of British miners at present on the dole here."

Hard to Guarantee Work.

Mr. Moore said that one of the chief difficulties in the earlier negotiations between the Nova Scotia Government and the British Empire Steel Corporation was the inability, or unwillingness, of the company to agree to guarantee the work of the miners. Even in the final settlement, added Mr. Moore, the best that has been given is a clause agreeing that local labor shall be given first preference before outside help is sought.

Lived On Tinned Food Since 1922

(Canadian Press) NOME, Aug. 21.—Captain Road Amundsen's auxiliary exploration schooner Maude drifting in Arctic ice since 1922 and now lying at East Cape, Siberia, waiting oil will reach here about August 25th en route to San Francisco to be sold. The crew has been living on tinned food since 1922.

New U. S. Gun Fires 550 Shots Per Minute

NEW YORK, Aug. 21.—An anti-aircraft model of the new 50-calibre Browning machine gun, the invention of which has been veiled in mystery by the war department, is being hailed as a real defence against air raids. The new gun, capable of hurling 550 quarter-pound projectiles a minute will be tested soon. In daylight tests Monday and Tuesday with old style guns only 19 hits were scored on air targets in 16,000 shots.

\$10,000 In Liquors Seized On N. S. Isle

HALIFAX, Aug. 21.—A cargo of 50 hoghead of blended whiskies and 425 cases of choice liquors was landed here tonight from the schooner Helena J. McLean, representing one of the largest seizures of contraband liquors ever carried out on the Nova Scotia coast. Officers of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police made the seizure on the shore of outer Lavare Island where the liquor had been cached by unknown parties. The lot is valued at \$10,000 and it is believed to have been set ashore by a liquor smuggling vessel which had been unable to dispose of the cargo and had cached it with the intention of returning to when business improved, rather than keeping it on board and paying expensive charter rates.

TWO BRITISH LABOR HEADS ARE AT WAR

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The differences between J. H. Thomas, M. P., Colonial Secretary in the late Labor Government, and Political Secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, and J. Bromley, M. P., Secretary of the Associated Society of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, have become notorious. This is illustrated in a challenge just issued by Secretary Bromley, who offers to pay £20 to the orphan fund of the rival unions if criticisms made by Thomas of the last strike of the Locomotive Engineers and Firemen, for which Bromley was responsible, are substantiated by Thomas.

Differences Between Thomas and Bromley Have Become Notorious.

Replying to this charge, Thomas reminds Bromley that he, Bromley, has not yet paid certain money due under a high court judgment "which he must know perfectly well could be claimed any time, but rather than prejudice his position as a parliamentary candidate, I have refrained from doing so." In this reply Thomas evidently refers to an action in which he, himself, and seven other officials of the National Union of Railwaymen were awarded £475 damages for slander against Bromley and other officials of the association.

Claim For Nearly Half A Million

MONTREAL, Aug. 21.—Claiming to have earned commissions amounting to nearly half a million dollars from the Canadian Car and Foundry Company by virtue of his having secured war-time contracts for the company from the Russian Government, S. Desail, a Russian agent, today took out an action against the firm for \$423,500. M. Desail avers he was promised a royalty of 14 cents a shell on an order of 3,000,000 shells. The order was not completely filled, he says, and the shells were not delivered to Russia, owing to the negligence and fault of the Canadian company. He also claims \$3,500 for other commissions.

\$500,000 Loss In France Due To Lightning

GRENOBLE, France, Aug. 21.—Airplanes, automobiles, electric appliances and Lyons silks valued at more than 10,000,000 francs (nominally \$500,000) were completely destroyed in the transportation and burning buildings of the National Water Power Exposition last night. A bolt of lightning set fire to the building. The exposition recently was inaugurated by President Doumergue.

SPEAKERS AT ELECTION IN GOOD ROADS NOVEMBER IS CONGRESS OTTAWA VIEW

OTTAWA, Aug. 21.—Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, Conservative leader, left here tonight for St. Catharines, where he will speak tomorrow, following which he will probably return to Ottawa. While Premier King and the Conservative leader have not as yet prepared any speaking itinerary, the signs in the opinion of certain political observers here, continue to portend the likelihood that the government will appeal to the people this fall, either in the latter part of October or early in November.

Conservatives to Have Candidates in Three-Quarters of Ontario Constituencies Before End of Aug.

With the Prime Minister now retired to the seclusion of his summer home, where he is expected to remain for several days, an official announcement of a decision on the question of an election will not be forthcoming until his return to the Capital at the earliest. So far a date has not been fixed for the holding of the next meeting of the cabinet.

Ex-Canadian, Bishop Among 9 Kidnapped

SHANGHAI, Aug. 21.—Nine British missionaries, including Bishop H. W. K. Mowll, former dean of Wycliffe College, Toronto, his wife and four other women, were carried off by bandits at Chengtzu, Szechwan province, August 6th according to an announcement today from the Church Missionary Society.

To Install New Lighthouse At Belle Isle

QUEBEC, Aug. 21.—C. G. S. Montcalm will sail from Quebec next week with the necessary equipment to install the new lighthouse at Belle Isle Straits. The lighthouse will also be a wireless telegraphic station which will be of great value to shipping.

Duke Of Devonshire May Again Be Governor General

(Special to the Guardian) TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 21.—The Duke of Devonshire may be again the Governor General of Canada in succession to Lord Byng, according to a prominent Canadian who has recently returned from England. It is recalled, however, that the Duke recently suffered a slight stroke and that he might accordingly feel averse to leaving the old country.

Boy Bandit Is Shot By Police

WORCESTER, Mass., Aug. 21.—Valter Desrosiers, one of the John Troy Bandit gang that has been terrorizing Worcester and Worcester County for the past two weeks, was fatally shot in a gun battle with patrolman Daniel Sullivan in a lunch car here this morning.

Wants Extradition Treaty With Canada

(Special to the Guardian) WASHINGTON, Aug. 21.—The United States desires an extradition treaty with Canada to cover liquor smugglers, Secretary of State Kellogg said today, interviewing the Canadian delegation which is here to draw up a regulation to enforce the treaty between the two countries. "I hope that it will be found possible to take measures whereby clearances of ships with cargoes of liquor destined for the United States, may be refused," Kellogg said.

Aircraft From Moscow now Enroute to Scene of Trouble

LONDON, Aug. 21.—Analysis of trade in Hong Kong with daily losses estimated at several hundred thousands of pounds sterling due to Chinese coastal regulations against British and Japanese shipping continues to agitate the press and to engross the attention of the Foreign Office. Austen Chamberlain, Foreign Secretary, has interrupted his vacation to deal with the situation.

TO SEEK OIL ON PICTOU ISLAND

HALIFAX, Aug. 21.—Possibilities of a gas and oil development on Pictou Island in Northumberland Strait off the mainland of Nova Scotia, were seen in the acquisition yesterday of a fifteen acre prospecting lease by Hugh McKay, a former Pictouan and recently a member of the Geology Faculty of Oklahoma University. Mr. McKay, who is understood to have large oil and gas interests in the United States, has made this branch of geology a special study and believes he will find oil and gas bearing strata on Pictou Island in such quantities as to make a large development probable.

Debt Mission Coming To U. S. In September

PARIS, Aug. 21.—The French debt mission will sail for the United States on Sept. 16. Its composition has not been announced, but is entirely likely that Finance Minister Cailhau will attend the negotiations. Meanwhile he will go to England next week to negotiate the French debt to England. It is reported the French government may offer to pay England £13,000,000 annually. The basis of England's settlement, with the Allies will be that London must receive from Germany and the allied debtors what England pays to Washington.

Australian Seamen Decide To Hold Up Work

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, N. S. W., Aug. 21.—A mass meeting of 1500 seamen here today unanimously decided that there would be no resumption of work until ship owners agreed to the men's demand for July rates of pay to all British seamen in all waters. The meeting adjourned until Monday next pending the calling of meetings of seamen in all Australian states.
