GRAIN. CHICAGO, Nov. 27-(AP)—The hard winter wheat belt drought and unfavorable crop reports from Argentina and Australia resulted in an upturn of wheat prices here today led by July, 1940, contracts which advanced as much as 3-4 cent at one stage. Wheat closed 3-8 lower to 5-8 higher, Dec 88-87 7-8, May 86-86 1-8. Corn closed unchanged to 1-4 higher, Dec 50 1-2, May 52 1-2-5-8; Oats 1-8-3-8 higher. WINNIPEG, Nov. 27-(CP)—From the start wheat futures showed a steady tone on the Winnipeg grain exchange and at the close were 1-4 higher to unchanged. At the close Nov was quoted at 70 7-8, Dec 70 3-8, May 75A and Jly 76 3-65. Buenos Aires rose as much as two cents, as frost hit the Argentine crops.

Livestock. MONTREAL, Nov. 27-(CP)—Higher prices for steers, lambs and calves were established today on the Montreal livestock market, the Dominion Department of Agriculture reported. No hog price was established. Receipts were calves, 1,053; sheep, 1,087; hogs, 1,933. Steers were 25 cents or more higher. Good steers made from \$7.25 to \$7.75 with medium steers \$6.25 to \$7.05 with medium steers. Heifers ranged from \$4.75 to \$6.50. Good selling for \$6 to \$6.50. Good ewes were \$5 to \$5.25 with odd tops at \$5.50, medium brought \$4.25 to \$4.75 and common \$3.50 to \$4. Canners and cutters were \$2.0 to \$3.25. Bulls ranged from \$3.50 to \$5.50 good bulls selling from \$5 up and the bulk of the medium bulls \$3.75 to \$4. Calves were 25 to 50 cents higher. Good quality veals were \$10.50 with an odd top at \$11. Medium veals sold up to \$10 and common light veals were down to \$7.50. Drinkers ranged from \$5.50 to \$7.50. Grassers were \$4.25 to \$5 selling mostly around \$4.75. Lambs were about steady to 25 cents higher selling at \$10 for good ewes and wethers. Hog lambs were cut \$1 per cwt. Culls and bucks were cut \$2 per cwt. Sheep were from \$3 to \$5. Hog prices were unsettled. A few early sale; were made at \$9.25 for bacon or trucks. Sows were \$6.25 to \$6.75 with an odd sow at \$7.

UNLISTED. Brett Tr 1, Dalhousie 45, Footbills 70, Penn Ore 265. TORONTO, Nov. 27-(CP)—Volume of trading and prices were barely firm on the Toronto exchange today. Mining shares held narrowly to the upside and the industrials and western oils closed slightly lower. Turnover was down from the recent average of 270,000 shares. Kerr-Addison and East Malartic registered new highs, holding gains of 3 to 5 cents respectively at the close. Central Patricia, LeMaque, McKenzie and Wright-Hargreaves, moved up 2 to 5 cents and gains came out for a group of penny issues, notably Broutin, Uchi, Laca Cap and Oro Plata. Changes were narrow in the base metal group. Smelters and Nickel posted minor losses and Noranda and Hudson Bay were unchanged. At the close the industrial group showed a loss of .32 in the index. Emblems and miscellaneous issues, including Fleet Aircraft, Imperial Tobacco and some of the textiles moved downward. The western oil market continued dull and final prices showed
