Campbell, as organist. Adjutant Hurd is a plain but forceful speaker. He held the undivided attention of the huge audience for upwards of two hours. He began by giving an outline of the work of the Army in England previous to the war, he showed where they had constructed from the wrecks of humanity, found in every walk of life, 700 recruits, and quite a number of those received the V. C. for bravery on the battlefield, he stated that the Salvation Army had spent during the war two million dollars and in order to carry on the work they had to ask the world for assistance, he gave a favorable report of his reception by all classes, and creeds and said that the Salvation Army was getting lots of free advertising since the boys were returning. At the close of the address Miss Smith who is a talented violinist gave several selections, also Miss Compton who needs no introduction, sang very sweetly. After the committee were named for the different school districts of the congregation, the meeting was brought to a close by singing the National Anthem, judging from comments heard on every hand since the meeting Malpeque will go "over the top."
