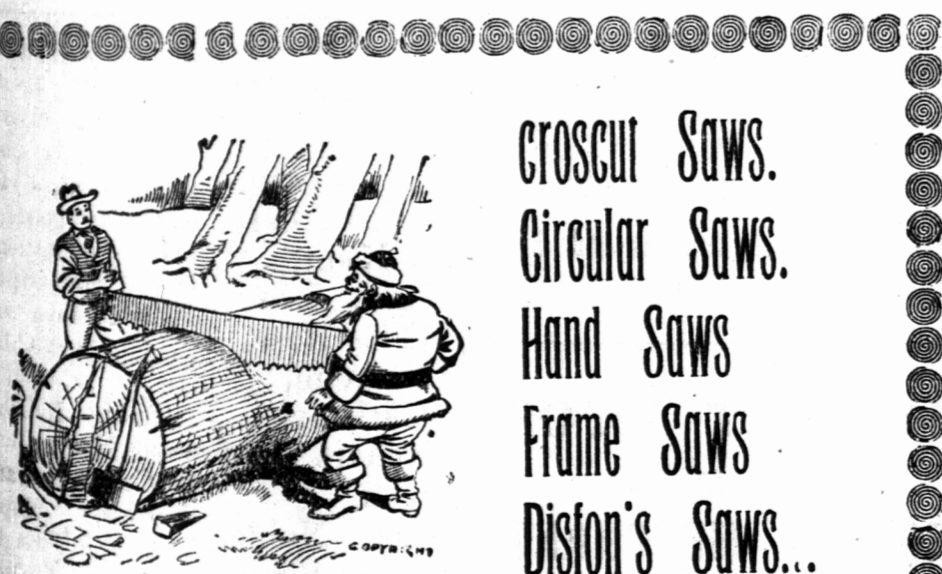

The foreign mail arrived in the city  
yesterday about 2.30 p.m.

REV. A. D. McLEOD will preach in  
the First Methodist Church tomorrow at  
eleven o'clock.

THE GUARDIAN sympathises with Mr.  
and Mrs. Morson in the sorrow which  
has come upon them by the death of  
their child announced to-day.

REV. J. W. MCKENZIE, St. Peter's  
Bay, brother of Messrs. J. T. and Neil  
McKenzie of this city, will preach in  
Zion Church tomorrow, both morning  
and evening.

MR. JOSEPH LANE returned yester-  
day from Bermuda, having left there  
on the 10th by the S. S. Harlow, of the  
Richford and Black line. Mr. Lane ex-  
perienced a very rough passage home.  
Mr. Ernest Duchemin, who accompanied  
Mr. Lane, will return home by New  
York and Boston, spending some time  
in both places.

FORTY-TWO bags of mail left Tor-  
mentine yesterday morning at 7 o'clock  
and arrived in town at half past two.  
The boats from Cape Traverse reached  
Cape Tormentine at one o'clock. They  
left this side at 7.15 and had 17 bags,  
11 bags of which were from Charlotte-  
town.

MALPEQUE.—Last Wednesday eve-  
ning was election night in the Mock  
Parliament at Malpeque, and consid-  
erable excitement prevailed among the  
members of the Society as to which  
party should gain the victory. Private  
canvassing was the order of the day but  
it is pleasing to say that there were no  
bribery or corrupt influences brought  
to bear upon the members. Shortly  
after the meeting opened the leader of  
the Liberal-Conservatives arose and on  
behalf of his party read the following:  
"On this the eve of a general election  
we realize the necessity of setting be-  
fore the electors of this country the  
policy of the Liberal Conservative  
Party of this Mock Parliament in regard  
to the finances of this Province. We  
pledge ourselves if elected—(1.) To  
purity of administration. (2.) Reduc-  
tion of salaries and amalgamation  
of offices in Public Lands, Justice and  
Legislative Departments and a general  
reform in Educational and Public  
Works Departments. (3.) Rigid econ-  
omy in every department of the pub-  
lic service to the extent at least of  
making revenue and expenditure meet  
and that districts desiring special ad-  
vantages must contribute the money. (4)  
To secure if possible the just claims of  
the province from the federal govern-  
ment and if successful the interest of  
the amount obtained will be devoted to  
lessening the taxes of the people and  
the public debt. (5.) An equalization  
of the taxes. He then explained the  
methods they proposed to adopt in  
carrying out the reforms above men-  
tioned after which a very lively discus-  
sion followed which lasted for upwards  
of three hours. Then the election took  
place which resulted in a substantial  
majority for the Conservative candi-  
dates. A cabinet was then formed and  
important bills announced for discussion  
during the six weeks that to follow.  
We confidently believe that if the Lib-  
eral Conservative Party of this province  
would lay down such definite policy as  
herein contained there would be no  
doubt as to the result of the coming  
election.
