In these days of flower-culture we are apt to forget the charm of our wild flowers. Yet in the country lanes and the open fields there is a wealth of beauty which will vie with the gorgeous blooms from the Isles of Scilly. And it is a beauty which does not flaunt itself before our gaze. It is a beauty unaffected, unadorned, serenely natural.

Perhaps the main source of enjoyment is to be found in the ability to observe the flowers of the wayside in a leisurely fashion—neither the cycle of the motor will assist the true lover of Nature. The botanist can, of course, see Nature's handiwork as it reveals itself in the composition of a

flower. But the ordinary person is satisfied without any analysis of its component parts. And wild flowers are accessible to all—they are found almost everywhere. They attend us at every step. Tipped with crimson, with lines of silver, the daisy

Ever alike, fair and fresh of hue, As well in Winter as in Summer new,

And at almost every season of the year buttercups may be found in bloom. The earliest to appear is the Lesser Celandine, which shows itself on sunny banks. Probably this was the flower of which Mary Howitt sang:

Somewhere on a sunny bank Buttercups are bright.

**POLICE COURT.**—There was a large docket at the Charlottetown Police Court yesterday morning and the following cases were disposed of: Wm. Mahar on a charge of drunkenness was adjourned until the 2nd of September, Mary McInnis vs. Bertha McLeod on a charge of assault was also adjourned till the 2nd. Two prohibition cases, one of Allan Boisner vs. Margaret McKinnon resulted in a conviction for the first offence and the usual fine of \$100 or 3 months imposed, the other one, that of Elizabeth McMillan for the fourth offence resulted in a conviction and the penalty of 6 months imprisonment was imposed. Frederick Crosby who was arrested for being drunk was dismissed as it was his first appearance. Hugh McCarron for the same offence was released after the fine of \$5 or 20 days was imposed.
