### Eatons Take First Play-off Game 7-3

SYDNEY, Oct. 16.—Moncton Eatons, champions of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, defeated Sydney's Christ Church, Nova Scotia title-holders, 7-3, here today to take the lead in the two-of-three game series for the Maritime football Championship.

The teams will move to Moncton for the second game, and the third if necessary. Smashing out 10 hits off the Nova Scotia pitcher, Eatons made only one error as Tiny John Melanson held the Sydney team to four hits with his clever offerings.

Only one Christ Church batter reached first base during the first five innings, while the New Brunswick team put three runs across the plate. Eatons added two more in the sixth and then Sydney fans had a chance to cheer as their team replied in the last of this inning with two scores.

The home town hopes were short-lived, however, as Burke crashed out a home run with one man on, to put Moncton ahead 7-2. McMillan scored the last Christ Church run in the eighth. Two bunts by Steeves and Whitneck, at the start of the game, failed to work, and both were thrown out at first.

### Louis Thinks Schmeling Will Be Easy

(By Earl J. Hilligan, Associated Press Sports Writer) DETROIT, Oct. 16.—Joe Louis catalogued Max Schmeling as "easy" today and then declared he would "go right into" James J. Braddock whenever he meets the New Jersey longshoreman in a heavyweight championship bout.

The "Brown Bomber," in Detroit for a brief court appearance, as witness in a civil suit involving a member of his entourage, never has seen the German in the ring. But he said he has a very definite idea of the style and ability of the former champion, who in all probability will be his next opponent, sometime in 1935.

On the basis of a close study of the motion pictures of Schmeling's fights with Young Stribling, Jack Sharkey and Max Baer, Joe quietly drawled: "I don't think he's so hot. From those pictures it looks like he can be hit with either hand and I don't think he can punch—at least not enough to hurt me much. He'll be easy."

The dusky dynamite does not believe the German will give him as much trouble as did Baer, who fell in the fourth round. "What do I think about Braddock? Well I wouldn't go around him if he were. I'd go right into him the same as I always do."

Joe isn't worrying about when his next fight will be held. He leaves all that to his managers. The Bomber is starting on an exhibition tour within a few days and says he is near ring condition now. An indication that the tour will touch at Montreal was seen in the licensing of Louis E. Detmer by the Montreal Boxing Commission for the staging in that city of an exhibition between Louis and a sparring partner.

The youthful boxer, whose wedding took place an hour or so before he knocked Baer out, was asked how he liked married life. "Oh, there's nothing like it, right now," he grinned, and then stammered, "I mean all the time!"
