## OVER BILLION FOR BIG GUNS.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The House Appropriations Committee today approved the largest fortifications programme ever submitted by this government. The bill carries a total of \$643,086,224, the principal expenditures being for heavy artillery.

Based on an American army of three million men, the plans which the measure supports have been approved by the Inter-Allied War Council, through Gen. Pershing. It was stated by Representative Borland, of Missouri, chairman of the sub-committee which framed the bill. While the programme provides for home defence and for coast defence, the chief concern is for the production of field artillery to be used on the western front. The total appropriations for heavy guns is \$1,220,731,395.

All of the new heavy guns, provided for in the bill, will be mounted on railway cars or motorized for rigid transportation, showing the War Department, as was recently intimated, is expecting a change from the trench to the open style of warfare.

## MILLIONS OF MEN AND BILLIONS OF MONEY

Secretary of War Baker Announces That United States Will Have 3,500,000 Men Under Arms In August.

WASHINGTON, June 27.—Secretary Baker disclosed to the Senate Military Commission today that within three months an enlarged army project now being worked out will be presented to Congress to represent the maximum fighting effort of the country.

Already the calculations upon which the pending Army Bill was framed have been exceeded, and the War Department is now revising its plans on an enlarged basis that means additional billions in money and additional millions of fighting men.

The full scope of the new measure is not yet apparent even to officials who are preparing it.

Mr. Baker disclosed the new plans in explaining his reasons for opposing any change now in the draft age limits. Later, during a general debate in the Senate Chamber, figures were disclosed showing the great strides being made toward bringing American fighting power to the front in France.

General March, Chief of Staff, already has announced that the army is five months ahead of schedule in troop movements, 900,000 men having been shipped abroad.

During the debate today, however, it was disclosed that if the highest hopes are realized, 1,450,000 men will have reached France some time in August, and that there will be a total force under arms of approximately 3,500,000. A statement read in the Senate record by Senator Chamberlain, Chairman of the Military Commission, credited that class one probably would be exhausted during October, and would be reduced to 641,124 men by calls to be made before August 1.
