N. Y. Stock Prices Advanced Saturday

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—(AP)—Selected stocks edged into November. Saturday with modest recoveries but for last week the market was brown for another moderate loss. Declines for the two-hour proceedings tapered to 300,000 shares against 400,000 a week ago. The Associated Press 60-stock Saturday composite was up 1 of a point at 63 1/2 but for the week was down 1 1/2. The Dow Jones industrial index held an advance of 8 after the two previous losing months. Of 715 issues registering in the brief session, 311 rose and 216 fell.

Low-quoted motors such as Graham-Paige, Hupp and Continental Motors were up a shade on the day. Bethlehem Steel again was the star performer in reaction of the 3 to 1 split proposal. It ended at 100, up 1 at a 1947 high. U. S. Steel and Youngstown Steel were up fractions.

Chrysler was more or less indifferent to a hoisted disbursement and finished up 3-8 at 63 7-8. General Motors added 3-8 at 60. American Smelting gained 1-4 at 63 3-8 and Lion Oil 1 3-5 at 31. Lesser plus signs were registered by Montgomery Ward, Sears Roebuck, International Harvester, Boeing, United Aircraft, Amsonda, Phelps Dodge, General Electric, Texas Co., Standard Oil (N.J.), Martay and Baltimore and Ohio.

Eastern Air Lines dropped 1-8 at 17 3-8, a year's low, in the wake of an omitted dividend and third quarter net loss. Behring were Santa Fe, N. Y. Central, Southern Pacific, Great Northern Railway, Kennecott, American Telephone, Goodrich and Sperry. Canadian Pacific and Dome Mines each dropped 1-4 and Disasters Seagram 1-8.

Kaiser-Frazer, up 1 3-8, was the liveliest of the day's curb sprinters.

Weekly Market Report

Unsettled conditions in the live stock market, due to the strike situation, appeared to be clearing up and deliveries to markets increasing. Commission firms, however, were warning shippers against any excess flow to market in case of overloading, with resultant decreased prices. There were small declines in cattle prices on eastern markets but western centres were generally steady to a shade firmer. Demand for replacement cattle was good and prices firm. Calves, sheep and lambs continued about unchanged, but the hog market showed firmness and advanced in price at some markets.

Eastern Cattle Markets

With packing plants reopening, the Toronto market took care of a good number of cattle at prices steady to 15c lower. Trade was inclined to be slow but weighty steers were taken up to \$15, but most sales at \$14.50 downward and butcher steers from \$11 to \$14. Store cattle were strong sellers, with good feeding steers at \$12.50 to \$13.50 and stock calves up to \$14.25. In Montreal, killing facilities were getting under way again and while the cattle offered consisted mostly of common to medium quality, prices were steady to 25c or more lower. A few good steers brought \$14 and medium kinds from \$12 to \$13. No quotations were available for cattle in the Maritimes.

Western Cattle Markets

Better grades of slaughter steers continued in firm demand at Winnipeg at \$14 to \$14.50 and at number moved at \$11.50 to \$13. Stocker cattle were in demand up to \$12.25. Elsewhere, trade was active despite liberal receipts, and Calgary placed best steers at \$13.50 to \$14.65. Edmonton at \$13.50 to \$14.65. Moose Jaw \$14. Saskatoon \$14. Regina \$13, and Vancouver \$13 to \$14.

Steady Calf Market

Little change was shown in calf prices. Toronto paid \$16 to \$16.50 for choice veals while Montreal had some good veals up to \$14.50 and an extreme \$15.50. Winnipeg quoted good light veals at \$14 to \$15, Calgary \$12 to \$13, Edmonton up to \$13. Prince Albert \$12 to \$13, and Regina \$12 to \$13.

Steady Hog Market

Hog prices firmed up and while trading was slow in getting under way, Toronto cleared at \$23 for Grade A and Montreal between \$21.50 and \$23. Winnipeg sold Grade A at \$21.95, Calgary at \$21.50, Edmonton \$22.25 for shipment, and \$21.50 at plants, Prince Albert, Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Regina \$21.70, and Vancouver \$22.40. In the Maritimes, prices were quoted at Moncton and Saint John at \$22.75 delivered, and at Charlottetown at \$22.75 f.o.b. country points.
