A disastrous fire of uncertain origin and swift development yesterday completely destroyed Seaman's Auto Body Works on Dorchester Street. The adjoining building, George Smith's Wood Mill, was later followed by a fire early in the morning, also suffered appreciable damage. Firemen received the alarm about 5:15 in the afternoon. The fire, which is thought, started in the rear of the garage, spread with great rapidity. A column of black smoke towered over the fire and attracted hundreds from all parts of the city. Firemen were aided in their battle by the absence of wind. Within a half-hour under control although it required a considerably longer period before the fire was extinguished. Repeatedly, while chopping between the two affected buildings, Mr. Harry Harley, a fireman, sustained a serious foot-injury received from an axe which he was using. He is confined to the hospital for a few days.

Damage was estimated by Mr. Seaman at approximately \$10,000 including the loss of four cars owned by customers of the Seaman. One of the cars destroyed belonged to Mr. Joseph Shelton Seaman, valued at his own loss at \$7,000.00.
