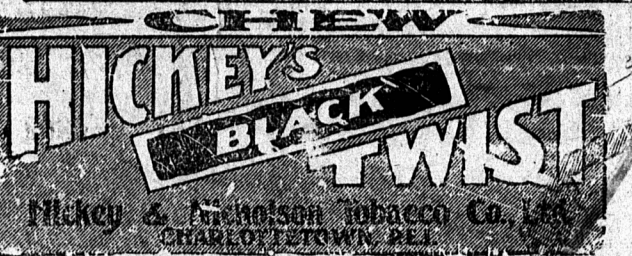

ISLANDER IN COMMAND. With the first cargo for a German port loaded in Jacksonville, Florida, since the days before the great war, the American steamer Galeaburg is taking on phosphate rock for Hamburg. The vessel which is being handled by the Strachan Shipping Co., will load 3,000 tons of phosphate at Jacksonville and will then sail for Savannah where she will complete her cargo with cotton. The Galeaburg is in command of Capt. Herbert Doyle, a Charlottetown boy, formerly captain of the Plant line steamer Halifax.
