Montreal Brokerage Firm Charged With Theft

MONTREAL, Sept. 26.—Jules Gosselin and George W. Fairbanks formerly partners in the firm of stockbrokers of Fairbanks and Gosselin are charged with the theft of agents of \$500,000. The property of their clients in a warrant sworn out at the court house today. The warrant signed by Judge Amedee Monet was issued at the request of Maurice Demers, acting for himself and other former clients of the stockbroking firm. The charges brought against the partners are that during the year previous to the failure of the firm, they converted to their own use stocks and bonds. When the firm went bankrupt, the early part of this year a compromise was made with the creditors.

Ideal Harvesting Weather Reported from Prairies

WINNIPEG, Sept. 26.—During the past week ideal harvesting weather has prevailed throughout the three prairie provinces, according to the crop report issued today by the agricultural department, C. P. R. Company. Yields are proving better than was anticipated and grades are uniformly good. Taking into consideration the recent prolonged wet spell surprisingly little sprouting has occurred and inspections show small percentage of rejected grain. Large areas in each province have already been plowed. Already considerable fall rye has been sown.

John Paris' Fifth Trial for Murder

ST. JOHN, Sept. 26.—Legal history for Canada and probably the world, will be made when John Paris, is tried before Chief Justice McKeown at the circuit court which will be opened on Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock, on the charge of murdering Sadie McAulay in Riverview Park on Aug. 2, 1921. Attorney General J. F. Byrne will conduct the prosecution and G.H. Vernon, K. C. will defend the prisoner as at the four previous trials. No word has been received from Mr. Vernon regarding the case. Seventy-one jurors have been summoned to attend, twenty-one on the regular panel and fifty on a special panel. This brings the number summoned on the five cases to nearly a hundred.

Charge Youthful Clerk With Larceny of \$127,000

BOSTON, Sept. 26.—That thefts from the federal Trust Company, for which Paul Downey, a 20 year old discount clerk, and two other men were arrested last night, amounted to \$127,000 instead of \$45,000 as first reported, became known today when they were arraigned. Downey, charged with larceny, was held on \$50,000 bail. Robert L. Finn and Humphrey Lane, alleged to have profited by the money taken from the bank, were held in bonds of \$75,000 each.

GOLF TOURNEY FOR MONCTON.

AMHERST, N. S., Sept. 25.—The maritime golf championships of 1923, will be played in Moncton, the executive of the Maritime Golf Association has decided after a mail vote, it was announced tonight. At the annual meeting at Charlottetown in August, tentative invitations were submitted from Moncton, Fredericton and Truro—Truro issuing the invitation with the proviso that it should be considered in the event that the New Brunswick courses were found unable to handle the championships. Play will take place about the middle of July.

U. S. Senate Votes \$200,000 for Relief Smyrna Americans

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25.—An appropriation of \$200,000 for relief of Americans in Smyrna, recommended yesterday by President Harding was voted today by the Senate. It was included in a deficiency bill and must yet be approved by the House. Rear Admiral Bristol at Constantinople reported today that his efforts to arrive at a joint plan of relief for all refugees a Smyrna with the British, Italian and French high commissioners had been delayed as the French commissioner was absent in Smyrna, and neither the British nor the Italian commissioners had received instructions on the point. The American admiral said destroyers under his command were assisting in evacuation work in Smyrna in every possible way, and that an additional destroyer had been ordered to that port. The American relief committee at Constantinople, Admiral Bristol said, had decided to continue its emergency work in Smyrna and to send a relief unit to Bodosto, where 50,000 refugees had been collected.

BOSTON SWIMMER GIVES UP ATTEMPT TO SWIM CHANNEL

DOVER, Sept. 25.—Charles Toth, the Boston swimmer, who started out in another attempt to swim the English Channel, abandoned the effort today when five miles from the French coast. He had been in the water fifteen hours and fifty minutes having swam 37 miles, counting his drift with the tide.

BRANTFORD'S MEANEST MAN

BRANTFORD, Ont., Sept. 25.—The meanest man has been found here, according to the local police—a man so mean that Magistrate Blake yesterday commented: "I can walk with a drunk and I can walk with a bootlegger, and even a man who has a still in his possession, but a man who would play a trick like that on a man unknown to him is too much for me." The man is R. Cutts, who with J. Simmons, was charged with having a still in his possession. Cutts a former O.T.A. operative stated the he and Simmons wanted to "frame" a farmer named Shore, of this district, so they placed a still in a pond on the Shore farm, then tipped off Inland Revenue officer Simmons who recently was fined for having a still, denied having anything to do with it. Magistrate Blake asked Cutts if he ever read a book called "The Bible" and on being informed by Cutts that he had, asked if he remembered the story of Judas Iscariot. Cutts didn't remember. Magistrate Blake then commented as given above and fined both men \$500, with a six months option, and until Monday to get the money.

RUSSIA'S DEMAND ON JAPAN MAY CAUSE PARLEYS TO END

CHANG' CHUN, Manchuria, Sept. 26.—An abrupt breakdown is eminent in the negotiations now going on here between Japan the Moscow Soviet Government, and the Far Eastern Republic of Siberia, owing to the Russian demand that Japan immediately evacuate the northern half of the Island of Sakhalien. Both instructions from their Governments announced today that they were prepared to depart.

BLOODHOUNDS ON TRAIL OF MAN IN WEST

LETHEBRIDGE, Alta., Sept. 27.—Bloodhounds are on the trail of Emile Pickarello, believed to be the driver of the automobile from which Constable S. O. Larson, of the Alberta Provincial Police, was shot down in the Crow's Nest Pass Thursday evening. Both ends of the Pass are blocked and the arrest of Pickarello is expected hourly. Three men have been arrested as accomplices, including Steve Pickarello, son of the wanted man.

LOST IN LONDON, FOUND IN NEW BRUNSWICK

ST. JOHN, Sept. 27.—LeRoy F. Harding, of St. John, was one of

the many Canadians who went early overseas to serve in the Great War. While in London, after the manner of one of the fads in vogue, he had a duplicate in metal made of his military identification disc which his wife wore as a bracelet. She unfortunately lost it in the streets of the great metropolis six years ago. Mr. Harding while in Burnt Church, a little village twenty miles from Chatham, recently was asked by a young woman if he happened to be from St. John and if he might possibly be the LeRoy F. Harding who went overseas. Harding acknowledged that he was the man and pointed to his service button. The young woman at once became very interested and said, "Well, your number is 74304, is it not?" Needless to say Harding was quite non-plus-ed and could only reply, "Well, you're a good guesser." "Not much of a guesser," replied the young lady. "Just look at this," and she displayed the very identical duplicate disc which his wife had lost in London six years ago. It was disclosed that brother of the young woman had found the lost disc in London and had given it to his sister who was at one time on duty in a military hospital in France.
