Special Subsidy Clause In N. B. Agreement With Dominion

FREDERICTON, Jan. 30.—(CP)—The proposed agreement between the Dominion and New Brunswick providing for temporary withdrawal of the province and its municipalities from the income and corporation tax fields contains a clause regarding a special subsidy which New Brunswick has been receiving as a result of the recommendations of the Duncan and White Commissions, Premier J. B. McNeil explained in a statement here.

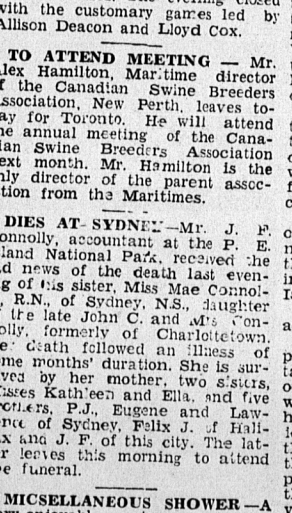
