THE SECESSION OF NORWAY.

Forty odd years ago when the southern States of the greater American Republic sought to withdraw from the union there resulted one of the bloodiest wars in history, and the seceding States were conquered and retained. Just now Norway has seceded from the dual union with Sweden, deposed her King and set up an independent establishment. Apparently this latest secession is not to be resisted by armed force and the separation is to be a peaceful one, with much of mutual respect and kindly feelings on both sides.

The differences between the two Scandinavian Kingdoms, so far as their government was concerned do not appear to have been very grave. Both peoples enjoyed the fullest measure of individual liberty; both were mainly of a common religious faith; they had acapable and well disposed King who was held in honor by both his Swedish and Norwegian subjects. This affection for King Oscar by the people of Norway was touchingly attested at the moment of separation by their expressed desire that he would permit one of his sons to become their Sovereign. This he could not do, but the request

must somewhat soften the harshness of the sudden separation. It remains to be seen whether Norway has decided wisely. Her people are few; her weakness may become a prey to greedy and rapacious neighbors. Sweden also will be much weaker than the united Kingdoms were. Meanwhile the separation of the two kingdoms after nearly a century of union affords an interesting and somewhat startling spectacle to the European community of nations. What if a craze for disunion and separation should now or hereafter set in?

A writer in The Examiner is astonished that The Guardian should picture the Czar as either a cruel despot or a weakling and not put Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the pillory in like fashion. We must confess to not having noticed any conspicuous resemblance between the two great men. Sir Wilfrid has more repute for sunny ways than has the Czar. He rules by means of a Parliament elected by the people, a large majority of whom give him their support. The people are free to send Sir Wilfrid into retirement at their pleasure but seem not disposed to do so. Where then is the resemblance between Sir Wilfrid and the Czar?

THE LATE HECTOR McLEOD.

Heartfelt regret is felt and expressed throughout a wide circle for the death of Hector McLeod of this city whose demise occurred at the P. E. Island Hospital during Thursday night. He was sixty-seven years of age, son of the late John Scott McLeod of Dunstaffnage and an elder brother of the late Hon. R. C. McLeod of Summerside.

Mr. McLeod was engaged in farming at Dunstaffnage until 1882 since which time he has lived a quiet life in East Royalty, doing a little farming and keeping some choice horses, in which he never lost his interest. More recently he resided on Upper Hillsboro Street.

Mr. McLeod was widely known and esteemed as a successful farmer, as a Director of the Driving Park Association, as a member and liberal supporter of the Presbyterian Church. A man of the highest probity, generous and accommodating, judicious in counsel and ever ready to help another, a good citizen and an honorable man, he has passed to his reward, leaving a fragrant memory to all who knew him.

To the mourning survivors, and near relatives of the deceased we tender heartfelt and respectful sympathy. Among them are his wife and their only son Frederick J. McLeod, counsellor-at-law of Boston; three brothers, William McLeod, of Cambridge, Mass.; Alexander on the homestead at Dunstaffnage, and George now very seriously ill at the P. E. Island Hospital; two sisters, Mrs. P. McN. Robertson, Marshfield, and Katie at home.
