P. E. Island Pharmaceutical Association Examinations

The board of examiners of the P. E. Island Pharmaceutical Association will meet for the purpose of examining candidates offering for registration on Jan. 31, 1906. Every candidate for examination shall satisfy the council that he has served as assistant in a drug store for not less than four years, and at least two of these years has been employed in the dispensing of prescriptions. Candidates must give their intention to present themselves for examination, at least fifteen days before the date fixed for the examination. Such notice must be accompanied by the examination fee of \$3.00 and by certificate to the satisfaction of the council that the candidate possesses the qualifications above prescribed. Any person entering his name and not presenting himself at the time and place fixed for the examination shall forfeit his fee to the Association.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

- (1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased of the homesteader resides upon the land in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.

The patients seem to have commendable freedom and employment and appear to be as comfortable as could be reasonably expected under the circumstances. We would strongly recommend that free crops be placed on the western end of the building now occupied by the male patients in addition to those at the east end occupied by the females.

The Poor House was next visited. There 23 persons are taken care of as well as the unsuitable building will permit. The Jail is the same old eyesore it has been for years; it is kept clean and tidy, its removal to a more suitable place is very desirable.
