Earl Derby Declares that if Young Men Medically Fit do not Come Forward by Nov. 30 Means will be Adopted to Compel Them.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—A strong intimation of compulsion at an early date is contained in a statement tonight by the Earl of Derby, director of recruiting. This statement is made, Lord Derby declares, with the authority of the Prime Minister. It says: "If young men, medically fit, and not indispensable in any business of national importance, or any business conducted for the general good of the community do not come forward voluntarily before November 30, the Government will, after that date, take the necessary steps to redeem the pledge made on November 2nd."

CONTINUED LANDING AT SALONIKI OF ANGLO-FRENCH TROOPS

Is Causing Great Uneasiness in Bulgaria and Turkey and has Brought Another Protest from these Countries to Greek Government. The Germans are Falling Back on Two Fronts before the Russians while the Bulgarians are Being Worsted by English and French. Balkan Situation is Clearing. Serbian Army in Safe Positions.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—The continued landing of British and French troops at Saloniki is causing uneasiness in Bulgaria and Turkey. Ministers of these two powers to-day again protested to the Greek government, which took formal notice of their protest. The determination of the Entente Allies to go through with the campaign is shown by the large force they are sending to the Balkans. According to news received from Rome to-day, Italy has also decided to intervene in this region. "In a manner worthy of her greatness," and to give sufficient support to the British and French to assure a complete triumph. This is said to have had some influence on Greece and Roumania. Roumania, however, is waiting for the development of the Russian plans. Meanwhile the Austro-Germans and Bulgarians are advancing slowly in their efforts to cut off or annihilate the Serbian army. These efforts, however, are growing more difficult as the Serbians have occupied, according to their official report, defensive positions to south-east of Kraljevo and East Ivanjica, and on the eastern front on the left bank of the southern Morava, where heavy fighting is in progress. Big battles are also proceeding in the south between the Bulgarians and Anglo-French, but reports are so conflicting that it cannot be said which side has gained the advantage.

MR. ASQUITH SCORES LIBERAL M.P.'S

Liberal Proprietor of Globe Defended by Three Other Liberals who Reiterated False Charges Against the Government. Mr. Asquith Indignantly Repudiates Allegations.

LONDON, Nov. 11.—During the course of a discussion in the House of Commons on the suspension of the Globe paper (owned by Mr. Cecil Harmsworth, Liberal M.P. for South Bedford), James Myles Hogge, Liberal member for Edinburgh, declared his belief that the statement that Lord Kitchener had resigned was true, and that seizure of the paper because of the publication of the statement was not justified. Premier Asquith, who immediately replied, said that Mr. Hogge accused him of "a deliberate and inexcusable falsehood," and to make the matter quite clear, he declared: "Earl Kitchener never tendered his resignation, either to the King or myself, the only two persons to whom he could have tendered it. Earl Kitchener never breathed a word of resignation to either."

LORD STRATHCONA NELSON BEQUESTS

Presentation of Victory Bronze Statuette to the Province. Interesting Ceremony in Legislative Chamber Yesterday.

In the Legislative Chamber yesterday at noon an interesting and unique ceremony took place, in the presence of a large and representative gathering of citizens, when the Rev. Alfred Hall, Strathcona Commissioner, presented to the Legislature of Prince Edward Island a magnificent bust of Lord Nelson, made out of copper from the Admiral's flag ship, to mark the conclusion of the distribution in this province of the Nelson Shields. The bust stands about 18 inches high, is mounted on a pillar of Victory oak and supported by a handsomely wrought pedestal, a true miniature of the pedestal of the Nelson Column in Trafalgar Square, London—and has the distinction of having been made in

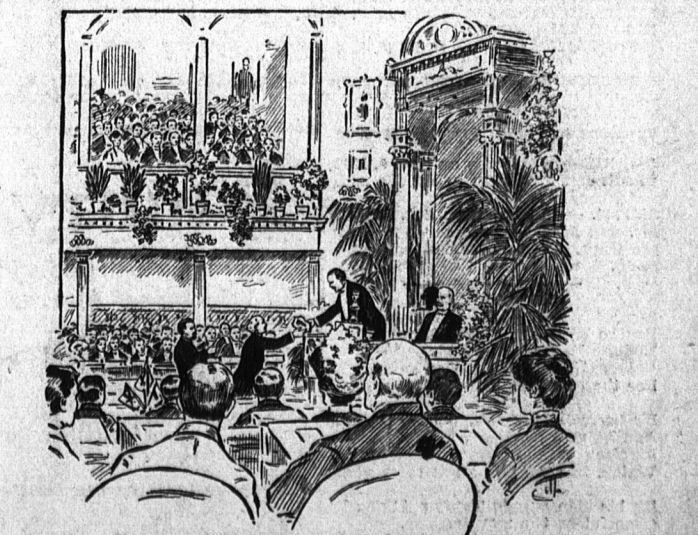
Canada. At the proceedings His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, Hon. A. McDonald, presided, and associated with him was Lieut.-Colonel Hon. S. R. Jenkins, M. D., who, in the absence of the Premier and the Acting Premier fittingly represented the Government. Considerable interest was evinced in the ceremony by the ladies, among whom were Mrs. J. A. Mathieson and Mrs. A. McDonald. Others present included His Honour the Chief Justice, Sir W. W. Sullivan, Mr. Justice Hazard and Mr. Justice Fitzgerald. The men of No. 2 Siege Battery, under Capt. Prowse, were in attendance, as also were several of the Cadet Corps of West Kent School, who had the enviable honour of conveying the bust into the building. A remarkable and interesting feature of the proceedings was the presentation, in addition to the bust, of a splendid artistic silver salver to His Honour the Lieutenant-Governor, and commemorative Nelson medals to Lieutenant-Colonel S. R. Jenkins, the Premier, Hon. J. A. Mathieson (through Lieut. Col. Jenkins) and Captain R. H. Campbell, and smaller medals of the same kind to each of the Battery. These valuable historic souvenirs are all made of the copper of Nelson's ship and are exquisite works of art. The salver presented to the Lieut. Governor has been embossed on it a sea picture typical of the days of Nelson. In the

historical signal, during the bombardment, to Capt. Lord Beresford, who went in under the forts at great risk. "Well done Condon." Captain Seymour was afterwards created Lord Alcester for his special services in Egypt. It is interesting to recall that when Mr. Hyndman presented his certificate of transfer from the "Victory" to H. M. S. "Newport," Lord Alcester exclaimed: "Holy St. Peter, Hyndman, why are you leaving me?" At noon the Lieutenant-Governor, in a few remarks, requested Mr. Hall to address the audience, informing them of the nature of the ceremony. Before doing so Mr. Hall, having described the bust, called on His Honour to unveil it. This done, he said that the present occasion fell into line with similar occasions in other provinces where functions similar to this had taken place or would take place. Through Lord Strathcona's generosity Nelson shields had been presented to 2500 educational institutions in the Dominion of Canada, and in every province, when the distribution had come to its natural conclusion, a similar historic souvenir to this had been presented. These Nelson Shields had been welcomed in every university, college and school, and by a consensus of expert opinion they had been of extreme educational value. They would remind the rising generation of the hand of God in our sea story, and would inspire them with a lofty conception of duty as expressed in Nelson's famous motto. Some persons had asked to what use the shield might be put. Lord Strathcona and

himself, as administrator, were not presumptuous enough to suggest to educational bodies what they should do with it; they could devise means themselves whereby the shield could be made useful. He would like to say, however, that the Nelson Shield which was in the Legislative Chamber at that moment, bedecked with the Union Jack and surrounded with the

centre of the pretty representation of the "Victory" putting into Gibraltar, and encircling the whole is Nelson's famous motto: "England expects that every man will do his duty."

Among those invited to be present was Mr. F. W. Hyndman, who served as Paymaster on board the "Victory" in 1868. The "Victory" was the ship in which Nelson fought at Trafalgar, and Mr. Hyndman's cabin was next to the one in which Nelson died. The commander of the "Victory" at that time was Capt. Seymour, who was afterwards, in 1882, Commander-in-Chief in the Mediterranean and, bombarded Alexandria, Egypt, at the Arab war. It was he who made the
