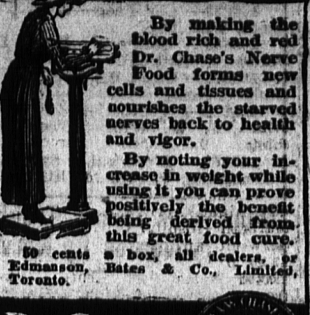

### Annual Meeting P.E.I. Egg and Poultry Asso.

(Continued from page one.) with the British market particularly with reference to bacon, beef, canned goods of all kind, etc. He spoke of his trip to England and France last year and all he saw there in the matter of markets. He strongly urged the audience to develop the poultry industry so that Canada might have a name for quality in the markets of the world.

Rev. Dr. Gauthier, in a brief but able address, spoke of co-operation. Co-operation, he said, was getting to be an old question on the Island, but so far as egg circles were concerned, it was a new one. He did not need to be preached. There were too many people everywhere, and nothing was so small and mean as that class of persons, who were known to "two cent" people for many of whom he would not care to give that much. Some people would not do anything for their cream to the factories, because they were too narrow. They generally found out, however, that it did not pay to kick. Co-operation was based on charity and opposed to selfishness. "We are working," continued Dr. Gauthier, "not for the present, but as for the future. In the future there will be a premium on quality and we will not be able to sell any old stuff and compete with the other markets of the world. We will have to produce something we can stand back of as Prince Edward Islanders and Canadians. Let us encourage our neighbour and be careful not to offend him in any way. If we cannot convince him the first time, let us try again when he is in a better humour. It would be better to have five intelligent men in a community working together than five hundred doing something in a slipshod manner. It only took twelve earnest men to go out into the world and preach the Gospel, and we have not got a gospel to preach. We must manifest a whole lot of zeal, and we must not be discouraged."

Mr. W. J. Macdonald, Dominion Live Stock Branch, followed with an excellent address on the egg and poultry situation in Canada. According to the last census, he said, the value of poultry and eggs produced and sold in Canada in 1910 was equal to the value of all the horses sold, and nearly equal to the value of the horses sold; was two and a half times as great as the value of the fruit sold. The poultry industry in Canada, he said, was a big and important one which they could well be proud of and compared favourably with the other interests in the live stock world, but the present production in Canada was not a fraction of what it might be, the resources being barely touched. On the whole, he thought that Prince Edward Island was doing better than the other provinces in the matter of poultry. He pointed out that the live stock industry in the Island and St. John nearly as much. Canada was producing a bare surplus at present above requirements, and in view of the fact that thousands of consoling soldiers in Great Britain needed eggs, that Canada could send, it was our duty, as patriotic and selfish, probably, to get busy and develop the industry to meet those demands. He said they should standardise, nationalise and advertise the products of the country.

Prof. McCready then addressed a few remarks to the meeting along the lines of education for the young boys and girls on the farms, suggesting that the farmers might occasionally visit the schools and give "talks" to the children on poultry and perhaps invite them to the farms, and give them practical illustrations.

The meeting closed with the National Anthem. The business will be resumed this morning.

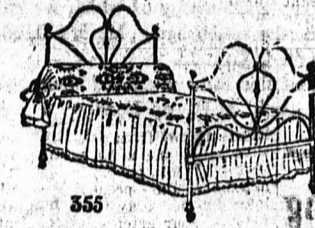

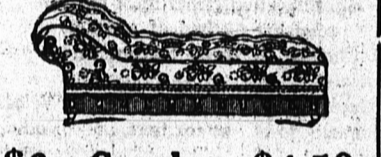
