In 1948 Canadians spent \$630,000,000 or \$48.00 per capita on drink, \$2,000,000 was spent for every working day. \$28.50 per capita was spent for sickness and death.

It was felt that there should be a heavier taxation on liquor.

A delegation waited upon the Prime Minister and members of the Government to make certain requests in the interests of a more sober and safer society.

The Canadian Temperance Federation has adopted a budget of \$10,000, and P. E. I. is asked for \$275.00, which the Executive voted the Federation should pay. Other business dealt with the appointment of a Maritime secretary and a sub executive consisting of Revs Howard Christie, S. J. Davies, and L. M. Murray.
