Thursday morning, Sept. 29, 10 o'clock, Mr. G. H. Vroman, M. D. of Ottawa, N. S., Fruit Inspector, subject "Packing Fruit for Markets Foreign and Local."

12 o'clock—Dr. J. M. Fletcher will make an exhibit of weeds and will describe the best methods of destroying same.

3.30 o'clock—Mr. A. P. Kett, subject, "Improvement of Agricultural Exhibitions."

4.30 o'clock—Mr. A. P. Kett, subject, "Requirements of a Cattle Stable."

7.30 o'clock—Mr. F. W. Hodson, subject, "English Breeds of Sheep."

8.30 o'clock—Mr. Fletcher, subject "Selecting and feeding of cattle for export trade" also "The various methods of destroying injurious insects with an exhibition of same. Many of these lectures will be illustrated with lantern slides. All farmers should attend these lectures."

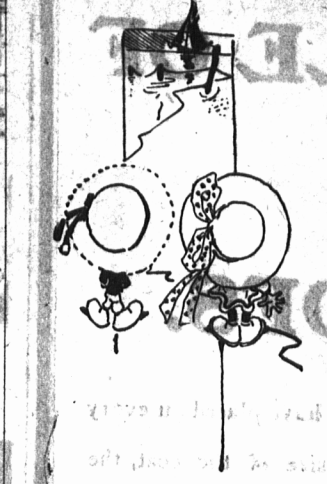
