COAL PRODUCTION IN FEBRUARY

Coal production in Canada during February amounted to 1,036,405 tons, a decline of 19.8 per cent from the 1,268,914 tons of the preceding month. In New Brunswick the output during February amounted to 25,034 tons, a slight decline from the January total of 25,758 tons.

An increase of 43 per cent was recorded in the output of coal in Alberta, the month's production was 494,600 tons as compared with 474,398 tons in January. Nova Scotia mines produced 273,942 tons, a decline of 212 per cent from the January total of 279,966 tons. British Columbia's output totalled 128,927 tons against 127,810 tons in January. Saskatchewan produced 113,902 tons in February; during the preceding month 115,311 tons were mined. In New Brunswick the output during February amounted to 25,034 tons, a slight decline from the January total of 25,758 tons.

MONTREAL, April 6—Butter and egg prices advanced on the Montreal Produce and dairy market today. The market ranged from 24 1/2 to 25 cents a pound, half a cent higher than yesterday. Receipts were 570 boxes. Good demand and a slight decrease in receipts sent fresh graded eggs in carlots on less up half a cent a dozen. Extras were quoted at 17 cents, first at 15 cents and seconds at 14 cents a dozen. Offerings totalled 1,819 cases.

Cheese remained steady at 10 1/2 to 11 cents pound for current Ontario colored. Arrivals were 50 boxes. Potatoes were unchanged.

Receipts at Prince Edward Island green mountains per 90 pound bag selling at 65 to 70 cents and Prince Edward Island green mountains per 90 pound bag at 75 to 80 cents.

MONTREAL, April 6—The recent upward surge in oil prices on the Winnipeg and Chicago grain exchanges was reflected today in increases on the Montreal cash grain market.

Number three Canadian western oats gained a cent a bushel at 34 cents while no 1 feed oats were up the same amount at 35 cents. South African corn rose four cents to 50 cents a bushel as demand continued heavy.

## Wild Life In Jasper National Park

GREAT ALBERTA RESERVE IS ONE OF OUTSTANDING GAME SANCTUARIES ALSO A LEADING SCENIC RESORT

OTTAWA, Canada, April 6—Jasper National Park in Alberta, Canada, is today one of the greatest wild life sanctuaries in the world. Here, in an area of 4,200 square miles, many species of wild life live free from human molestation. At the time white men first entered this region, a little over a century ago, big game was plentiful. Bighorn sheep and Rocky Mountain goat fed on the hillsides, deer and elk ranged the valleys and the flats a few miles south of the present Jasper townsite were frequented by buffalo. The whole country was a rich hunting ground for both white men and Indians.

When Jasper National Park was set aside in 1907, by the Government of Canada to meet the recreational requirements of the people and to serve as a refuge for the native fauna, great inroads had been made in the wild life by hunters. As a result of the establishment of sanctuary conditions the preservation of the different species of wild life indigenous to that region has been assured, and now hunters may feel confident of having an unending supply of game in districts adjacent to the park.

One of the chief attractions to visitors at the present time is the variety of wild life which may be seen along the motor highways and trails in the park. Bear, moose, deer, bighorn sheep and mountain goat may frequently be seen from a car, while caribou may generally be sighted in the high open passes of some of the nearby mountains.

In recent years there has been a remarkable increase in the wild life of the park. It is estimated that the number of bighorn sheep has doubled within the past few years in the Athabasca valley. They are especially numerous at Pochontas Interlaken, Brazeau river, Snake Indian valley, Moose Horn creek and Southesk river. Rocky Mountain goat are numerous and are spreading to new ranges in the park. The largest herds of these animals are to be found at Shale Banks, Smoky river, Col'n range, Maligne Lake, Whistler mountain and Circus valley.

EK, moose, deer and caribou are seen in large numbers throughout the park. The elk, which had so nearly been exterminated a few years ago, have increased to such an extent that now they are extending their range in many directions. Reports state that they have been seen as far west as McBride, British Columbia, on the Canadian National Railways, which is one hundred miles west of the park. Moose are also increasing in numbers, especially in the northern part of the park, which is heavily timbered and well suited to the needs of this animal. Deer in the park are rapidly increasing in numbers. Caribou are spreading throughout the park and overflowing from the Smoky River area into British Columbia, as far south as the Canadian National Railways line. The main herds are about Byng pass, Twin Tree lake, Tonquin and Circus valleys, Smoky river, Brazeau valley, Upper Sharning river, Dom-

A huge corporation is formed, competition is keen but the swamp is exploited and several people make their fortunes.

"Imagine! while this swamp remains undiscovered, people are literally killing themselves exploring forests to find a stream where they may fish for a few brook trout or spend lives picking a few bits of copper from a grudging earth!"
