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Annual Meeting Of Presbyterian Church, S'side

The annual business meeting of the Summerside Presbyterian Church was held in the church hall on Wednesday evening, the 18th inst., when the church activities for 1938 were reviewed, and financial statements were submitted by all the different branches of the church organization. There was a larger attendance than usual at the meeting, which was opened by Rev. Mr. Verwolf with singing, devotional exercises, after which the proceedings were conducted by Mr. C. R. Rogers, chairman of the Board of Managers. By way of entertainment, readings by Dr. J. Shaw and Mrs. J. S. Perry, and musical numbers by the male quartet of the church—Messrs. J. O. Moun-

tain, J. L. MacKay, W. E. Forbes, and B. Graham Rogers—were interspersed throughout the business programme. The ladies of the congregation served refreshments at the close of the proceedings.

The financial reports submitted by the Treasurer, and by the of- ficials of the various church organizations, showed a most healthy condition. All 1938 obligations had been paid in full, and a small credit balance carried forward to 1939. Net cash receipts during 1938, from all sources for regular church purposes, amounted to \$4,714.05. In addition, the chairman gratefully acknowledged receipt of two legacies during the year—one of \$10,000 from the estate of the late Mr. S. M. Hicks, and another of the same amount from the estate of the late Mrs. T. D. Ramsay. These amounts were placed in a special account, and a committee was appointed to consider the best uses for which these funds could be used, and to report back to the congregation. The chairman also extended the thanks of the congregation to Mr. Donald Baker for his gift of a \$100.00 fifteen year endowment policy on his life, made payable to the church, and on which Mr. Baker pays the premiums in addition to his regular subscription. Also to Dr. J. A. McMurdo for a donation of \$100.00 as the nucleus of an endowment fund. The chairman also announced that a bronze tablet to the memory of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ramsay was being presented to the church by members of Mrs. Ramsay's family. This memorial is in course of manufacture at the present time, and on arrival, will be appropriately presented and dedicated, of which notice will be given to the congregation.

Heavy votes of thanks were tendered to Mr. and Mrs. Verwolf for their leadership during the past year. Also to the Ladies Aid and Young Ladies' Club, and other church organizations. The ladies who so generously provided and arranged the beautiful flowers which decorated the church all through the summer and fall months, received particular mention and thanks. The janitor, Mr. Pickett, who has been so conscientious and faithfully performed, also came in for the grateful appreciation of the meeting. The church treasurer, Mr. J. Lloyd Corroll, was called to the front, and presented by the session with a very fine pen and pencil set, as a token of appreciation of the splendid service he has given for a number of years past as church accountant.—S.

Guiana "Ideal" For Settlement

GEORGETOWN, British Guiana, Jan. 19 (CP Cable)—Dr. Paul Zabl, member of the staff of Hastings Laboratory, New York, arrived in Georgetown today from the summit of Mount Roraima, in the hinterlands of British Guiana, and described the district as "ideal" for the settlement of Jewish refugees from Germany.

A mission settlement in that area was growing all crops that were grown in California, he said, and other facilities of the district were favorable.

Two newly discovered districts were reported by Dr. Zabl. One, a sheer drop of 1,600 feet, will be named for King George VI. His Majesty approves the idea, and the other is 1,200 feet high.

Ducos Linked In Conspiracy At Hearing

HALIFAX, Jan. 19 (CP)—The name of Captain Henry Ducos, believed to have perished when the motorship Annuik foundered on a trip from St. Pierre, Miquelon, to Halifax in December was injected today into evidence at preliminary hearings at the Brunswick court on liquor conspiracy charges.

Thomas P. Slattery of Saint John and William Babineau of Moncton were arrested on charges of conspiracy to defraud the Federal Government following a \$11,000 liquor seizure on the Moose River road, near here, last September. Joseph Leo LeBlanc of Ste. Anne de Kent, N. B., is charged with Slattery and Babineau, and is a fugitive from justice.

Cecil Bayers of Halifax gave evidence today. He said he was employed by Captain Ducos as a wireless operator, and went to Saint John, where he met Slattery. He was shown a wireless set in the upper part of a house occupied by Slattery, and he got in touch with the motor vessel Admiral Beatty about Dec. 20, 1937, on Slattery's instructions.

The witness described landings of alcohol from the Admiral Beatty, later seized by authorities, the flashing of messages from shore to ship, and the activities of New Brunswick men on land and sea.

Sydney Regan of Halifax was called to give evidence, but was ordered to stand aside when objection to his admission was raised as he is charged in another indictment with the same offence.

Joseph Babineau of Moncton and formerly of Ste. Anne de Kent said he had participated in the handling of 350 kegs of alcohol on Ste. Anne's shore in September, 1936. In a speed boat which got in touch with the Admiral Beatty in May, 1937, Leo LeBlanc hired him as a fisherman and later in the year he landed 200 kegs of alcohol on LeBlanc's orders on the speedboat Richibucto 62.

Other trips to meet the Admiral Beatty were described by the witness, who said on one occasion a speedboat went out to meet the Beatty, but a cutter was there. The cutter took the boat and detained the men aboard overnight. Next morning they were released.

The preliminary hearing was adjourned until tomorrow.

Remained at Fontenelle

Abbe d'Anjou remained at Fontenelle while his successor continued his duties in the church. The former used his home for church services for those members of the congregation who could not attend the church. Public donations for a new church are being accepted. A laymen's committee of various denominations in Moncton is assisting this work.

The method of distributing relief monies from the Quebec Government was read by the Bishop and Abbe.

The former parish priest and his supporters recently made their application to the Miramichi Presbytery, said Mr. Hayward. The latter, Rev. P. M. Sampson, of Boom Road, and Rev. R. J. Kirkwood, of St. James, were appointed a committee to investigate the situation. After a visit to Fontenelle they reported favorably regarding the application. Approval of the Presbytery followed.

"There is no bitterness in the matter," said the local clergyman. "I am appealed to us for help, and we are going to do it. Mr. d'Anjou is a fine type of man, with great ability, and he has the entire confidence of New Brunswick people who have come to know him."

Is Drowned At Halifax

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Jan. 18—William Macdonald, 61-year-old Halifax stevedore, drowned today when he broke through the ice of Nine Mile River here. Macdonald sank after clinging for 35 minutes to a log thrown into the water by two companions who attempted to rescue him.

Council Reports Surplus Of \$125 In Current Revenue

The Summerside Town Council held their closing meeting for the year last night with the Mayor and all Councilors present. The highlight of the meeting was the showing of a surplus of \$125.69 in current revenue over expenditure. Total revenue for the year was \$33,392.24, expenditure \$33,266.55. Revenue from electric light \$55,303.09, expenditure \$42,219.46.

Mayor Campbell congratulated the council on the surplus on current expenditure and said the town has nothing to fear as it is on a sound financial basis. He warned the council that the debt must not be increased unless for some very important purpose.

The outgoing councillors, MacKay, Mollison and MacNeill all signified their intention of offering their services for another period. Councillor MacKay made a resolution congratulating a former member of the Town Council, Captain J. S. Allen and wife in attaining 50 years of happy married life.—S.

Gaspé Priest And Followers Join Presbytery

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) DALHOUSIE, N. B., Jan. 19—Rev. Real d'Anjou and 80 parishioners have broken away from the Roman Catholic Church at Fontenelle on the Gaspé coast in Quebec Province, and have been admitted to the Miramichi Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

Rev. C. E. Hayward, Dalhousie, said tonight at a meeting of the Presbytery in New Brunswick Jan. 13 admission of the congregation was approved.

Application of Mr. d'Anjou for admission to the ministry of the Presbyterian Church was recommended by the Presbytery. He will be considered by the General Assembly meeting at Midland, Ont., in June.

(A spokesman in the Roman Catholic Bishop's Palace at Gaspé, and the former parish priest, Fontenelle today confirmed that he and 80 members of his congregation had severed their connections with the Catholic Church. Neither the spokesman nor Mr. d'Anjou gave the reasons for the break.)

Unrest caused by disagreement with policies of Bishop F. X. Ross, of Gaspé, had been felt in the Fontenelle parish for some time, Mr. Hayward stated tonight.

The situation occurred in October, 1936, when another priest came to replace Abbe d'Anjou.

The parishioners were highly indignant, said Mr. Hayward. One man tried to prevent the new priest from saying Mass, and the offender was sentenced to five months in jail.
