OBITUARY.—It is with sincere sorrow we chronicle the death of Austin G. McGilveray, youngest son of Daniel McGilveray, Esq., of Cherry Valley, which sad event took place at his father's residence, on June 3rd, inst., at 3 o'clock a. m. The deceased had been suffering from spinal trouble for about ten months and despite the best medical attendance and most tender nursing, death claimed him for his own. Austin was a young man of most generous and gentlemanly type, and his death at the early age of twenty-six, just in the prime of budding manhood, has cast a shadow of sadness around his native home. A clever young student and a successful teacher, his future seemed full of promise. But the dread summons came and his young spirit, fortified by the best rites of his church, went hopefully forth to meet the reward of long and patient suffering. By his death the community has lost a bi-hearted, generous and charitable friend. His funeral took place on Sunday the 4th at 2 o'clock p. m. there being upwards of one hundred carriages in the procession. The services at St. Joseph's were performed by the Rev. Dr. Doyle. To his bereaved parents, brothers and sister we tender our sincere sympathy.

WEATHER probabilities on P. E. I. R. trains. In connection with weather signals on P. E. I. trains, which are displayed on side of baggage car and to be carried on afternoon train daily during summer season. The signals which in the past indicated the weather for the same day, will hereafter indicate the weather of the following day, and are displayed as follows: The signal indicating fine weather is a white disc, with a black edge. The signal indicating showers is a white half moon on a black disc. The signal indicating rain is a white star on a black disc.
