WILLIAM STEWART DEAD.—On the evening of the 20th there passed away at the residence of his nephew, Charles Young, Basin Head, William D. Stewart at the good old age of 81 years. He was sick but a few days and passed away cheerfully, conscious to the end. He is survived by one sister, Mrs. Mathilda Young, the last of the family of the late Duncan Stewart who emigrated from Perthshire, Scotland, in the early years of the last century, and settled in the forest at West River, East Point.

For some unexplained reason the usual body of fish did not visit the Gulf this season and the fishermen worked very hard for a reduced quantity.

GERMAN ROYALTY'S CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION

BERLIN, Dec. 21.—Notwithstanding the war-cloud hovering over Europe and the industrial depression that of late has become pronounced in many sections of the empire, the approaching celebration of Christmas is monopolizing German attention as completely as ever. There is no feature of German life which shows so little change. The Imperial family will celebrate the holiday with all the traditional German customs. Christmas trees, one for each member of the family, will be set up in the shell room of the new palace at Potsdam. The trees will be arranged according to the age of the person represented—the Emperor's the tallest, that of the Empress second, and so on downward to the youngest of the Imperial grandchildren, and each of the trees will be loaded with presents for that particular person.
