HORSE STEALING CASES IN COURT

Before Stipendiary Brehaut yesterday George Loder and Joseph McAleer, were arraigned on the charge of horse stealing from Lawrence Morris, Royalty. H. J. Palmer K. C. appeared for the Crown.

Lawrence Morris, West Royalty, testified to missing his mare, wagon, driving harness and two wraps on the night of Monday, the 26th. He suspected Loder as once, as he had been around there and knew the place well having worked there two years ago, and a few days last July.

Witness tracked the wagon towards town and saw the tracks of a man in the wagon shed. The tracks were made by a man wearing boots with large iron nails in the heel. Loder's boots (produced in Court) had such nails in them. The missing mare was brought back to him on Saturday night, having the appearance of being greatly overdriven. She was worth about \$100 and the whole outfit about \$108, the wagon being an old one.

Daniel Ramsay, Baltic testified that two young men giving their names as Welsh and Doucette and whom he now recognized to be prisoners came to his house on the 26th. He traded horses but when they were leaving suspected the animal was stolen. Later he learned of the stolen horse and reported to Mr. Morris, the owner, and delivered the mare to Sergt. Bradley and Constable Moose.

DAY, farmer of Kensington recognized Loder and another man whom he believed to be McAleer, as the parties who came to his place between six and seven o'clock Thursday morning. They were walking when he saw them. They said that they had driven a long way, and that their horse, which they had let out to pasture, had got away. After getting a drink of water they went off.

Sergeant Bradley told of the search he had made and which was outlined in The Guardian last week.

The case, after further evidence had been heard, was adjourned for a week.

Three more charges will be heard next week, viz., stealing a buggy from Patrick Welsh, Stanley Bridge; breaking into the store of Alex. D. Ross, Eldon, and stealing a wrap and whip from Patrick J. Murphy, Millview. There are also two charges for larcenies in King's and Prince Counties.
