THE SHEEP INDUSTRY.

Here are a few facts contained in the report on the sheep industry, briefly referred to in these columns yesterday.

In 1881 Prince Edward Island had 166,496 sheep. The number was reduced to 125,546 in 1901 and in 1910 to 75,000 head.

Canada has barely 2,000,000 sheep, as compared with 51,216,000 in the United States, 67,000,000 in Argentina, 31,852,777 in Great Britain and 134,096,688 in Australia and New Zealand.

Canada imports about six million pounds of wool, vast quantities of woolsen goods and of mutton yearly, which ought to be produced in the country.

Canadian sheep as a rule are indifferently bred, poorly housed and poorly fed. Wool is badly washed, and marketed without system.

In all the older Provinces the ravages of dogs are complained of and in the West the coyotes, while in Great Britain the dog laws are very simple and effective.

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MONTEREAL, Jan. 14—Passengers on the Rutland railway express from New York to Montreal had a rude experience this morning when about 4 o'clock the three pullmans at the rear of the train jumped the track...

The embankment saved the situation as the cut through which the train was passing was the cars wobbling over a fairly steep...

Several passengers were thrown from their berths, but no one was badly injured, the worst casualty reported being a broken finger.

The travellers were transferred to the first-class cars, suffering considerable inconvenience while waiting for the train, as the temperature was twenty-five below zero and the sleeping cars cooled off very quickly, the heating apparatus having been broken.

EDMONTON HOSPITAL BURNS DURING A FIERCE BLIZZARD

EDMONTON, AL., Jan. 13—With the mercury at twenty below zero, and a hurricane sweeping over the north Saskatchewan valley, the twenty-five patients were rushed out of the burning Edmonton Hospital at midnight, narrowly escaping cremation, half of the building was burned.
