KING GEORGE ORDERS FULL INQUIRY INTO STATUS OF THE NEW PRINCESS

LONDON, Sept. 11.—The constitutional status of Great Britain's new baby princess, who is yet unnamed, is causing considerable agitation and it is reported that the King has called for a full inquiry.

It had generally been supposed that this child, born to the Duke and Duchess of York at Glamis Castle three weeks ago, would rank fourth in succession to the British throne—or after her uncle, the Prince of Wales; her father, the Duke of York and her elder sister, Princess Elizabeth.

It is pointed out, however, that there is no law in Britain which says whether one sister shall outrank another in royal succession or whether they shall be co-heirs.

Officials of the Home Office today refused either to deny or confirm the report that the King had ordered a special inquiry.
