FROM TRURO.— Mr. David Schurman, of North Bedouque, returned yesterday from Truro, where he had been taking a course in the agricultural college. He has completed a course in Truro and intends to go next year to either Guelph or the McDonald College. He took two years in Prince of Wales College, taught school for a time and then determined to take a course in Agriculture. He had been very successful in his class work.

BACK FROM GUELPH.— Mr. Michael Coughlin returned yesterday from Guelph, Ontario, where he had been taking a course in agriculture. Mr. Coughlin took the first two years in Truro and last summer engaged the Department of Agriculture. In the autumn he went to Guelph, taking his third year. Mr. Coughlin has gained a vast experience of conditions abroad, and in reply to a reporter of the "Guardian" yesterday as to how he liked Ontario, he said Prince Edward Island was better than ever before!

FROM FRANCE.— Mrs. C. W. Kiely of this city received a letter from France yesterday from her son, Leroy Kiely, which told her that he has been quarantined in a hospital, about forty miles from France, with diphtheria but was now out and would proceed immediately to the front. Mr. Kiely, who is only twenty years of age, is in good health now and weighs 160 pounds, which speaks well for the food which the men receive. His home friends who were anxious about him, no letters having been received for several weeks, will be pleased to learn that he is now out of quarantine and his future letters will be eagerly looked for.

ORCHARD SPRAYING.— This is the time of year when fruit growers should be taking care of their orchards. Travelling is now so bad that not very much can be done on the farm and the fruit-grower, who in this province is farmer as well, can get his orchard pruned, grafted and sprayed. The various departments of agriculture have issued a large number of bulletins on these subjects which can be had for the asking. The dormant spray, which destroys scale, scab and the eggs of lice and other pests, can be applied now any fine day. It is made of 15 pounds of sulphur and 18 pounds of lime to 40 gallons of water. Nothing but quick lime should be used. The proper amount should be put into the boiler and water put on it so as to slack it properly. While it is still slacking the powdered sulphur should be put on it so as to create a great heat. It should then be boiled hard for at least an hour, at which time it is ready for use. 15 pounds of sulphur and 18 pounds of lime are sufficient to compound 40 gallons of spray. It is best applied warm. Commercial lime sulphur can also be used, but it costs a little more. Full information in regard to this matter may be had from the Department of Agriculture, Charlottetown.

CONAN DOYLE SCORES TEUTONS

LONDON, April 15.— Conan Doyle says: "It is difficult to know how to act in the case of these European Red Irishmen who torture their prisoners. It is clear that we cannot retaliate by spitting on, shaking, beating, starving or freezing Germans who are in our power.

"All appeals to good feeling are unavailing, for the average German has not more understanding of chivalry than a sow has of mathematics. When we speak kindly of Capt. Von Muller, Weddigen, or any of our opponents, who has shown some approach to decency his papers describe it deep artistry to sentimentality and partly to hypocrisy. We have no doubt that when German aeroplanes drove away our boats while we were endeavoring to pick up survivors of the Blucher, they were really unable to conceive what it was we were trying to do.

"If there is no retaliation which we as a nation can employ, there is at least one line of action which might be taken; that is, to print Major Vaudouleur's account of the American official reports and such documents as the narrative in the Dutch paper 'Tid of the Torture of three wounded British prisoners in a frontier station in October.' This paper should be officially sent, not only to all neutral countries, but it should be circulated among our soldiers in France. No man fights the worse for having his soul aflame with righteous anger, so the

should use the weapons which we enemy has put into our hands. We will teach our men also, if any of them need the lesson, that it is far better to die upon the field than to trust to the humanity of a German victor."

NORWAY'S TONNAGE GREAT—BEST PER CAPITA IN WORLD

MONTREAL, April 17.— Norwegian shipbuilders can scarcely keep with the demand for vessels. The shipowners find the war so advantageous to their trade that in need of more vessels, they are turning to obsolete craft. They are taking old whalers and other vessels that had been marked for the grave, fitting them with gasoline engines and screws and pressing them into service. The local shipyards were never so busy as now, in tonnage per capita Norway's mercantile marine is the largest in the world. It has 527 tons for each thousand inhabitants, as against 242 in Great Britain.

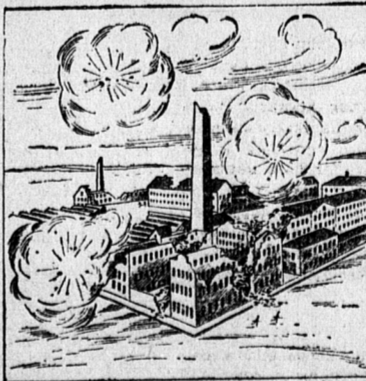
