USE NO PHOTOGRAPHS WITHOUT CONSENT.

ALBANY, N. Y., Oct. 31.—The Court of Appeals in a decision recently upholds the constitutionality of the act passed by the Legislature of 1903, designed to prevent without consent the use of a person's photograph for advertising or trade purposes. The Court affirms a judgment of the lower courts in awarding one thousand dollar damages to Aida T. Rhodes, of New York, who sued the Sperry and Hutchinson Company for displaying her picture in its office without consent.
The court in an opinion by Judge Willard Bartlett holds that the law is not applicable to photographs taken prior to 1903.

ROOSEVELT FIFTY YEARS OLD.
WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 31.—Theodore Roosevelt, 26th President of the United States became fifty years of age this week. Congratulatory messages poured into the President's office and at the White House all day. Many foreign rulers took advantage of the opportunity to send messages of warm friendship and good will through their representatives, who in person called and presented them to the President.

CHANGING TASTE IN CHRYSANTHEMUMS.
LONDON, Oct. 31.—Chrysanthemums of all possible colors and degrees of curliness were seen when the October show of the National Chrysanthemum Society opened recently at the Crystal Palace. The large and elaborate "dressed" Japanese blossoms are not so popular as they were, and they are gradually being ousted from favor by the single chrysanthemums, which lend themselves better to decorative purposes.

FEAR THAT STEAMER

FOUNDERED WITH CREW
LONDON, Oct. 31.—Wreckage picked up in the North Sea confirms the fears that the steamer Yarmouth foundered two days ago while crossing from the Hook of Holland to Harwich. The Yarmouth was a channel freighter belonging to the Great Eastern Railroad Company. She carried a crew of twenty three men and it is believed that they all perished.

BIG BUSINESS BLOCK BURIED AT ST. JOHN'S

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 27.—C. A. Evans, superintendent of the Royal and Queen Insurance Companies received a cable despatch recently from their agents at St. John's, N. F., giving particulars of a big fire there.
The despatch reads: "The whole block of Burt, Gordon & Co., was totally destroyed by fire, which started at five o'clock this morning. No amount of loss was given, but it has been estimated that the loss will be between \$400,000 and \$500,000. The buildings destroyed were all brick. The Royal and Queen Insurance Companies are interested in the insurance here."

SUFFRAGETTES WERE SENT TO PRISON.
LONDON, Oct. 31.—All the suffragettes with exception of two who were arrested last night during the disorders in and around the House of Commons, were this morning arraigned in court and fined \$25 each. They refused to pay and were consequently sentenced each to one month imprisonment. Of the two exceptions one was a girl under twenty-one years of age and the other a woman who secured adjournment to lodge a charge of assault against the constable who arrested her.

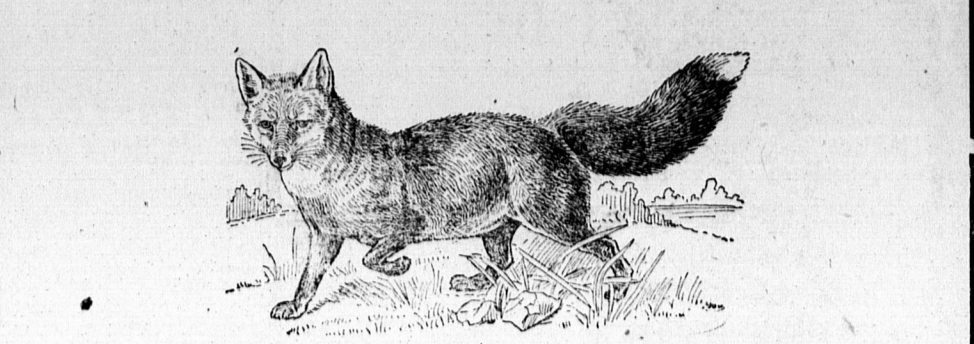
REV. A. R. GORDON, M. A.
