**CHAPTER OF ACCIDENTS AND DEATHS.**

**Resident of Montague Narrowly Escapes Instant Death—A Bicyclist Meets with a Painful Accident.—A Runaway in Summerside with Three Ladies and a Child in a Carriage.—Sudden Death of a Brookfield Lady.—Death at the P. E. I. Hospital.—Other Deaths.**

In another column in this issue will be found the obituary notice of the little three year and seven months old son of Capt. John Murchison, Master of the "Omega", which sad event occurred on Saturday last. The funeral took place yesterday from his home Chestnut street at 9 a. m. to Point Prim.

As Mr. Burns, son of the late Mr. Jesse Burns of Freetown, was driving into Summerside Saturday his horse became frightened at the railway crossing and ran up Water street. In the buggy with Mr. Burns were his two sisters Miss Burns, Freetown, and Mrs. French and child of Boston. When opposite the store of Messrs. Warren Hicks & McMurdo Bros. the horse turned, bringing the carriage in collision with a post. All the occupants were thrown out. Mr. Burns was somewhat severely hurt about the head, but the ladies and child although pretty badly shaken up, escaped unhurt.

Mr. W. S. McLaren met with a somewhat serious accident on Friday evening last. While wheeling from Bonshaw his wheel broke down in the vicinity of North River Bridge. Mr. McLaren was able to wheel into town where he had his wounds dressed. Besides having his nose broken his right hand was rendered completely useless. He went east to New Perth.

Mr. Angus Gillis, son of John Gillis, Esq., Head of Montague, was injured yesterday while working a binder. One of the horses became unmanageable and Mr. Gillis went up between them to set everything aright; but the others, too, became uncontrollable and started to run, causing him to fall directly in front of the blades. Had he not retained his presence of mind he would certainly have been seriously injured if not killed; but he managed to extricate himself from the very dangerous and difficult position in which he was placed by dragging himself on to the top of the platform. He received some bad cuts and bruises but is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances. Dr. Martin of Grand View, was in attendance.

The sudden death of Mrs. John J. Carson, Brookfield, which occurred on Sunday morning at an early hour, has cast a gloom over the entire community. It seems that her two sons, Edward and Thomas, had returned from the United States on Saturday evening by the express and went to their home. It was late when the party retired, but all were feeling well. Sunday morning Mr. Carson arose to light the fire; Mrs. Carson complained of feeling unwell, and expired in Mr. Carson's arms. Before her sons could arrive on the scene her spirit had winged its flight to the realms of the eternal. The funeral which took place yesterday was very largely attended, there being over seventy carriages in the procession. The interment took place in the Milton Cemetery. Rev. Mr. McLeod officiated at the house and the rector of Milton took the service at the church.

Our readers will regret to read in another column, the death of Miss Clara McLean, youngest daughter of Capt.

Hugh McLean of the Jacques Cartier. Her death, coming as it does in the bloom of youth, is a particularly sad one. On Tuesday last she was taken ill, and later was operated on for appendicitis and peritonitis. It was at first thought that medical skill and tender nursing, aided by youthful vigor, would triumph, but it was not to be, and yesterday morning the disease ended fatally. Her two sisters, who were spending their holidays with friends in Cape Breton, were telegraphed for, and returned via Pictou this morning, only to learn that death had entered the home. The deceased was endowed with many bright and kindly qualities and was greatly esteemed by her companions for her goodness of heart. She had a cheery smile and a good word for all, and will be much missed by her associates. Last Monday night she gave in her name for membership to the Secretary of Zion Church Christian Endeavor, and was to have been enrolled last night. Her grief stricken parents and sisters have the unspeakable comfort of knowing that her name has been enrolled by the Recording Angel in the church above, where there shall be no more death, neither sorrow nor pain.

The death took place at West Point, on Saturday, of Mrs. Thos. Flaiger. Mrs. Flaiger complained of being unwell during the day, and died in a few minutes after the first intimation of her illness. The remains were brought to Hunter River by train and interred in the Cemetery at Wheatley River yesterday. Mrs. Flaiger was on the Island visiting and spent some days with her sister, Mrs. Gae. Foster about a fortnight ago.
