Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency at the Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at the Agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, wholly owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section of land on a homestead. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Five cents per acre in each of 2 years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to own homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$100 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of 2 years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

The Christian Guardian of Toronto has the following: The portrait on the cover of this paper will be familiar to many readers of The Guardian, as that of the Rev. Jesse Whitlock, over sixty years a Methodist minister. Bro. Whitlock was born in Langtree, Devonshire, England, November 3rd, 1824. In 1831 he came with his parents to this country, settling in Prince Edward Island. In a revival meeting, conducted by the late Rev. Messrs. P. Methersall and P. James, in 1840; he was soundly converted to God. In 1848 he entered the ministry of the Bible Christian Church. For twelve years he labored with great success on the Island, when he was transferred to Ontario in 1862. On all these fields the Lord wonderfully blessed the labors of his servant. For many years Bro. Whitlock had been chairman of districts, and in June, 1872, he was called to the chair of the Conference, in which he proved a wise and efficient presiding officer. In 1895, after an active ministry of forty-seven years, and at the age of seventy-one, our esteemed brother was placed on the superannuation list. For the past five years the family have resided at 227 Sumach Street, Toronto, and their church home is Parliament Street Methodist Church, where they are greatly honored and respected. Bro. Whitlock, as he goes on and out among the people, carries sunshine into many homes, his presence a benediction and his counsel and prayers an inspiration. In 1854 Bro. Whitlock was united in marriage to Miss Mary P. Methersall, daughter of the late Rev. P. Methersall, who through all these years has been a devoted Christian, a faithful help-mate, an affectionate mother, and a cheerful and true friend—one of God's elect ladies. The Rev. Frank Whitlock, of Cleveland, Ohio, is a son.

PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

EVENING SESSION.

MR. WYATT resumed his speech at 4.40. He asked how did the system of education now compare with what it was in 1906? He quoted from the report of Inspector Kiely that the schools are not as good as they were ten years ago, that the system is not practical, and tends to lead boys away from the farm. He also quoted from Inspector Boulier's latest report to show the backward condition of schools in Prince County. He also read a resolution adopted at a public meeting in Beauce condemning the present system and calling for agricultural teaching in the schools and colleges. He read further extracts from reports showing that the sanitation and ventilation of the schools is bad and that disease, notably consumption, is spread broadcast there. The Government is responsible for this scattering disease abroad, which it was their duty to stamp out. Last year the deaths from all causes in the Province had decreased, but the deaths from tuberculosis increased from 13 per cent to 15 per cent. One hundred and fifty deaths from consumption, a preventable malady, made a loss far greater than the new \$70,000 subsidy. He had no doubt the disease was communicated by milk from tuberculous cows. Taking up the Lunatic Hospital report, he showed that the taint of insanity was largely hereditary. Over 140 out of 243 inmates in the hospital are of this class. Dr. Goodwill says if insanity is to be diminished, it will be by prevention, not by cure. What is the Government doing to prevent the spread of insanity? Nothing. Turning to the finances he argued that the public debt is larger than the amount of our credit at Ottawa. He quoted from a speech of Sir George Castler before confederation to show that abundant provision was made for carrying on the provincial Government without direct taxation. He quoted Sir Alexander Gait to the same effect. The same contention was put forward in our own Legislature in 1873. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was quoted to the same effect. But it was found that this Province had not near enough income. The question now arose, when the Government accepted the increase of \$70,000 in subsidy, whether they got what we are entitled to, or sufficient to enable us to live. He argued that we should have received an additional sum on account of special conditions, our isolation and winter disabilities. British Columbia got \$100,000 a year in that way. It did not appear that our delegates had even asked for anything on these grounds. Coming to the matter of our claims against the Dominion, he feared that if this matter were not handled in a better fashion we should get very little. He regretted the weakness

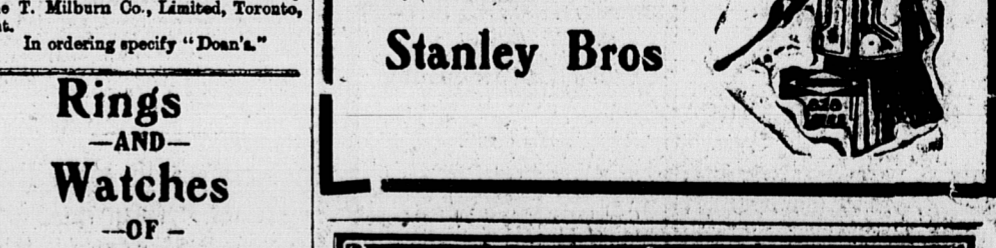
