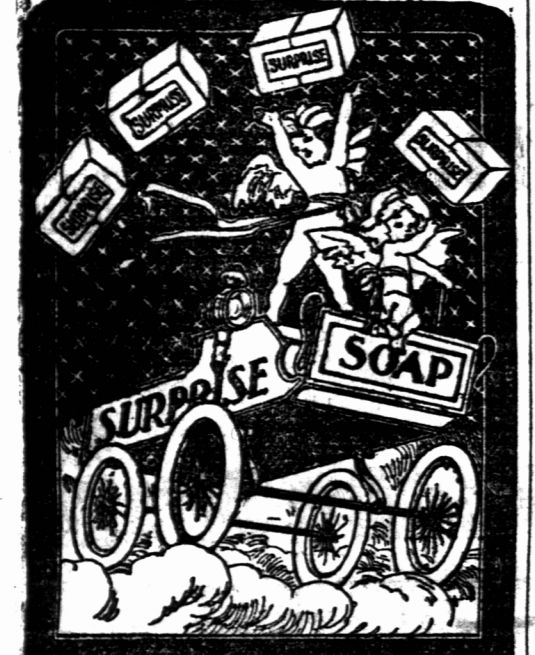

PROF. J. A. RUDDICK ARRIVES IN CH'TOWN

Interviewed by the Guardian in Reference to the Cheese and Poultry Business.

CHEESE BOXES SUPERIOR TO OTHER PROVINCES.

The System of Instruction Which Covers Every Factory Evidences That the Business was Correctly Organized.—More Poultry Stations to be Organized Throughout the Province—Incubators Being Introduced.

Mr. J. A. Ruddick, Chief of Dairy Division, Commissioner's Branch, Department of Agriculture was in the city yesterday afternoon and a GUARDIAN representative waited upon him at the Davies in reference to the progress of the dairy in the Maritime Provinces.
Mr. Ruddick stated that he had been in Nova Scotia and was en route to New Brunswick looking over the creameries which the department at Ottawa are managing on the same lines as the cheese factories were managed some years ago in this Province. The creamery and cheese factory business does not seem to be as prosperous there as on the Island. There are very good prospects, however, in Mabon and at Scottsburn near Pictou. This is the first year for these creameries and they have apparently got an excellent start. The product is good and there is every indication of a first-class future.
In dealing with the cheese business of this province Mr. Ruddick says: "I took a drive out to Hillsboro and Hazelbrook factories and called on the Secretary of the P. E. Island Dairy Association, Mr. Robert Jenkins.
"The cheese business of P. E. Island has two important points: 1st.—The manner in which the cheese is put up. I refer particularly to the boxes. The experience or I should say the record of the past has been that the cheese from this province has landed on the docks of the Old Country with a smaller per cent of broken boxes than the cheese from any other province as a whole. This is certainly a strong point. The better grade of boxes should only be used.
"The second point which I wish to place special emphasis upon is the complete organization to carry on the work of instruction covering every factory in the province. Such organization certainly shows the advantage of getting started right and then the producer is able to follow it up, conducting a perfect organization."

CHICKEN FATTENING.

Coupled with his interest in the cheese business Mr. Ruddick will visit the different parts of the province to arrange some work in connection with the chicken fattening station. He is doing this work because of the illness of Mr. Hare, poultry expert, who is at present confined to the hospital with an attack of typhoid fever.
Mr. Ruddick says that the fattening of chickens for the British market is very popular among the farmers of Ontario and in one district a co-operative society has been formed. The degree of success in Prince Edward Island has been encouraging. Especially has this been true of Mr. A. A. Hillson's experiment. The department feel encouraged by the results of past years and two or three additional stations will be operated this year. The new stations will be at Rusticoville and Vernon River Bridge. A distinct advance has been made in the introduction of incubators in this Province and the farmers are beginning to realize that
