**PAPER MONEY DESTROYED**

RIO DE JANEIRO, Aug. 23—The provisional government of Brazil has taken up and destroyed nearly all of the \$31,000,000 worth of paper money which the deposed Washington Luis regime put out to finance its unsuccessful defense against the 1930 revolution.

Thirty thousand copies of the issue was recently burned leaving only 40,000 copies (about \$2,800,000) yet to be disposed of.

**CAR LOADINGS INCREASE**

Car loadings for the week ended August 12 amounted to 38,644 cars, which was an increase over the previous week of 889 cars, and the index number rose from 63.34 to 67.10. August 7, observed as "Civic Holiday" in many municipalities, has had a greater effect in the eastern division than in the western division in past years and its effect was evident this year also.

Total loadings in the eastern division declined from 25,266 cars for the previous week to 25,152 cars, merchandise showing a decrease of 569 cars, grain of 216 cars, and coke, lumber, pulp and paper and ore showing smaller decreases.

In the western division grain showed an increase from 2,948 cars for the previous week to 4,204 cars and the index number rose to 219.07. Total loadings amounted to 13,492 cars as against 12,509 cars for the previous week.

**CANADA'S INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN JULY**

Canada's domestic exports in July totalled in value \$51,345,011, compared with \$42,318,084 in July, 1932, a gain of \$9,026,927 or 21 per cent. Last month's export was the largest since October 1932 and, with that single exception, the largest since December, 1931.

July imports were valued at \$35,738,380 compared with \$35,710,571 in July, 1932. It was the largest monthly import since last November, when the total was \$37,769,947.

**PLANT AWAKENS STUMPS SAVANTS**

LONDON, Aug. 23—Horticulturists were surprised and puzzled recently at the behaviour of a South African "Cycas" plant which suddenly burst into life at the Royal Botanical Gardens after sleeping for 10 years.

The plant was found in the South African section of the Wembley Exhibition in 1923. It was then a stock, and was taken to the Botanical Gardens where it slept until last March when suddenly leaves sprouted from the trunk and within a week or two it was covered with beautiful foliage.

**SHARP INCREASE IN EXPORTS TO EMPIRE COUNTRIES**

Canada's domestic exports to British Empire countries in July totalled in value \$25,416,975, which was an impressive increase of \$6,067,152 or 31 per cent over July, 1932, and was the highest monthly export to Empire countries since October, 1931.

The domestic exports to the United Kingdom in July totalled \$21,393,270, an increase of \$5,304,920 or 32 per cent over July, 1932, and, with the exception of November, 1932, when there was a specially heavy export of grain it was the highest monthly figure since October, 1931.

**PEACE PACT ANNIVERSARY TO BE OBSERVED AUG. 27**

WASHINGTON, Aug. 23—Leaders of a group of United States organizations arranging for a nationwide observance of the fifth anniversary of the signing of the Kellogg-Briand Peace Pact Sunday, August 27, have asked President Roosevelt to issue a proclamation calling world attention to its obligations.

The Women's International League headquarters here announced the request had been sent by Mrs. Hannah Clothier Hull, of Swarthmore, Pa., National President of the League, and Mrs. Herbert McMullen, of New York, chairman of international relations of the National Federation of Women's Clubs, among others.
