Adams Seeks Waivers On Kelly, Sorrell In Drastic Shakeup Of Detroit Lineup

Goal-getting Record Set By Stewart

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 29—Old "Slippy" Sam, known formally as Nelson Stewart, twice winner of the Hart Trophy and highest scorer in the National Hockey League, has established a new record for rapid firing.

Almost at the time they were saying "Old Poison", was slipping Sam and not the slippery Sam of goal-scoring fame, Stewart sniped in three goals last night in seven minutes and 16 seconds on bewildered Tiny Thompson, the Boston goaler to earn New York Americans a 3-2 tie against the only undefeated team in the league.

It was only last season when Big Sam was sent to America that the talk started the rounds that Nels was slipping. But the only slipping he did in Boston last night was slipping of the puck into the net so rapidly he outdid the fast firing mark set by little Ken Doraty in 1934.

Doraty's mark had stood since Jan. 16, 1934 when the little right winger rapped in three goals for Toronto Maple Leafs in seven minutes and 30 seconds.

"I haven't received the official score sheets for last night's game," said Frank Calder, N. H. L. President, "but if newspaper reports are correct, then Stewart has established a new record."

Boxing Show Will Be Staged —23 Years Late

TORONTO, Nov. 28—(CP)—William Hanna, an Irishman and sentimental, will stage an amateur boxing show here next week—23 years after it was first scheduled. The story behind the show is this:

On Aug. 3, 1914, Hanna and nine friends organized the Maple Leaf Athletic Club, asked the Ontario Government for a club charter, proceeded with plans for the show. The next day Canada was at war. Permission to hold a card of fights was granted by the Government but Hanna and his nine friends had signed up for another fight. All were fatally wounded overseas except, Hanna.

Just the other day he received the charter of the Maple Leaf Athletic Club from the Government. And the show goes on—23 years late.

Ed. Wiseman Stages Goal Scoring Spree

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, Nov. 29—(CP Cable) Eddie Wiseman, Newcastle, N. B. boy whose burst of goals in the last weeks of the 1936-37 National Hockey League schedule brought him right up among the scoring leaders, is beginning to come into his own again.

The speedy New York American wing gained three points last week to come within a point of second place among the league's former Maritime scorers.

Moncton's Gordie Drillon continued to set the point getting pace for former Maritimers and official statistics tonight showed him with 15 points, eight goals and seven assists.

That total gave him a nine point margin over Boston's sharpshooters Bill Cowley and Ray Gelfin, whose six points placed them second among the Maritimers.

Gelfin, formerly of Saint John and Charlottetown, has four goals and two assists while Cowley, once a Halifax Wolverine, has scored one and assisted in five other goals.

Wiseman's four goals and one assist placed him in the next position and Flash Hollett, Pete Kelly and Des Smith counted a point apiece. Hollett, Bruin defenceman from North Sydney, N. S., and Smith, Maroon rearguard who played amateur hockey in Saint John and Charlottetown, have scored goals, while Kelly, Charlottetown boy with Detroit, has an assist.

Al Delaney Loses Close Decision To Anzac Boxer; Edmonton Fighter Wins

(By The Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 29—(CP Cable) Al Delaney of Oshawa, Ont., tonight lost a close decision to Maurice Strickland, the New Zealand Heavyweight, in a 10-round main bout on the Harringay Arena boxing card.

The fight climaxed a night of boxing in which four Canadians showed their wares in two London rings but only one of them was successful.

Eddie Wenslob, Edmonton's heavyweight billed here as the "cowboy boxer," emphasized his comeback by punching out an eight-round decision over Robey Lebrandt, South Africa's heavyweight champion, also at Harringay.

Toronto Boxer Loses

At Earl's Court Ken Robinson, Toronto, lost on points in a 10-rounder to Ben Valentine of the Fiji Islands, on the same card as Stafford Barton, Jamaican middleweight, knocked out Yorkie Bentley of Calgary in the eighth round of a 10-round bout.

Maroons Meet Hawks In Only Game Tonight

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Nov. 29—Only one National Hockey League game is scheduled for tomorrow night but its result can change the standings in both the Canadian and United States sections.

Montreal Maroons and Chicago Black Hawks will clash here in the first meeting of the clubs this season. Victory for Maroons would break their third place deadlock with Canadiens while the Chicagoans by winning could jump ahead of Rangers into the United States division's second place.

Both teams reported at full strength but Maroons will have a reshuffled lineup as part of Coach King Clancy's scheme for bringing more goals.

Herby Cain, regular left winger on the Gracie-Marker line will be shifted to centre with Jimmy Ward and Baldy Northcott as his wings. Jerry Shannon will take Cain's place on the other line.

Clancy tried out these combinations in Detroit Sunday night and found them satisfactory. Cain's speed proved a help to the "red" line and he gave Northcott a perfect pass for one goal.

Praha Scene Of World Hockey Championship

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) One of the highest scoring combinations in the International American Hockey League last winter, Providence Reds' "speed line" of Doggie Kuhn, Sammy McManus and Jackie Keating is having a hard time getting goals this season.

With three weeks of hockey under their belts, the three former Maritimers have been able to get only four points between them and as a line they have scored only one goal. That went to Kuhn, once a Truro Bearcat.

Keating, formerly with Saint John Beavers, has one assist, while McManus, member of Moncton Hawks' Allan Cup teams, scored an unassisted goal and helped Kuhn on his point.

Statistics today showed Crosley Sherwood of Saint John, rookie Pittsburgh Hornet forward, leading the Maritime scorers in the league. Sherwood, with three goals and two assists, is one point ahead of Lloyd Jackson, New Glasgow, N. S., and Bert Connolly, another Moncton Hawk ace.

Jackson, New Haven's star wing, and Connolly of Springfield both have scored twice and assisted on two goals. They are a point ahead of two Charlottetown boys, both with Pittsburgh, Ron Hulson and Harry Currie.

Wait (Nig) Brenneman of Cleveland is another Maritimer whose name is on the scoring sheets. The former Saint John and Charlottetown player scored his first goal last week.

Drillon Paces Leaf Mates For N.H.L. Scoring Honors; Red Horner Tops In Assists

(By The Canadian Press) MONTREAL, Nov. 29—The National Hockey League scoring race has developed into a family affair between members of the Toronto Maple Leafs. Conny Smythe's snipers have all the individual honors and most of the second and third places, too.

Tonight's batch of official league statistics puts Leafs' Gordie Drillon at the head of the parade with 15 scoring points, eight goals and seven assists. He's two up on his teammates, Harvey Jackson, who has seven goals and five assists, and Red Horner, who has two and 10.

In actual goals, Drillon and Jackson are out in front in that order. And big Red, the reformed bad man, is tops in assists. Behind him are two Leafs again—Drillon and Syl Apps, with seven apiece.

Seven of the first eight spots at the top of the Canadian point standing go to Leafs. The lone outsider is aged Nels Stewart of New York Americans, who was helped along into fifth place by three goals he picked up against Boston Bruins last night. Old Sam's tabulation credits him with one assist more than the unofficial count.

Marty Barry, centre of the slumping Detroit Red Wings, leads the United States division with Doc Romnes of Chicago Black Hawks. Each has eight points, but Marty's five goals put him one up on Romnes in this class.

Baldy Northcott of Montreal Maroons is away out in front in the penalty list, with 35 minutes on the bench. Babe Slebert of Montreal Canadiens trails with 25. The team standing shows Boston topping the league with 14 game points, one more than Leafs.

Binns, who has been angling around for a bout the past month, eagerly accepted the bid to meet Leslie and although giving away much in poundage intimated that he is confident of taking the Souris batter. Both fighters will in a manner be trying to redeem themselves. Leslie in losing his crown to Biggar and Binns in losing out to "Irish" Leo Kelly.

Leslie when matched with Biggar expressed himself as eager for an opportunity to regain the Island heavyweight crown before leaving for the States, but when fate stepped in to dash his hopes he was more than willing to take on Binns whom he already holds a victory. The ex-heavy champion holds the aggressive city slugger in no little regard and plans to leave nothing in doubt to assure victory.
