GOOD LOBSTER SEASON—With the lobster fishing season closing on Wednesday, Mr. S. T. Gallant of the Fisheries Department reports that on the whole the season has been a good one. The total catch for May was 300,000 pounds in excess of that of May, 1928, and it is expected that the June catch will be equal, if not greater, to that of the corresponding month last year. Shipments of live lobsters are considerably in excess of those of last year, and though it is difficult to estimate, it is expected that the quantity canned is also greater.

NEW BOAT READY FOR WEST INDIES SERVICE

MONTREAL, June 22—The S. S. Connector, formerly the S. S. "Canadian Sapper," which has been for some months in the dry dock at Saint John undergoing complete refitting for the Kingston (Jamaica)-Belize (British Honduras) service, is now ready for that service. This ship will complete the requirements of the Canada-West Indies treaty so far as it affects transportation between Jamaica and the British Honduras, linking the latter colony with the Canada-Jamaica service, which is being performed by the "Lady Somers" and the "Lady Rodney," and other ships of the Canadian National System.

She is equipped specially for passenger and fruit service between Belize and Kingston, making connection with the ships north and south bound.

In outward appearance she resembles in a striking manner the famous ships that she will make the link between the two southern colonies.

TAKE LESS BAGGAGE NOW THAN FORMERLY

MONTREAL, June 22—Because women wear less clothes, and the clothes they wear are lighter, less baggage is checked relative to the number of people travelling today than ten years ago, says John Graham, who has been handling baggage at Bonaventure station of the Canadian National Railways since 1897—32 years ago.

About one million pieces of checked baggage go through Bonaventure station in a year. This is roughly equivalent to one piece of baggage for every individual in the city of Montreal. In 1928, 124,000 pieces of baggage passed through Bonaventure station in September. This was the peak month when people were returning from their vacations and compares with 44,000 pieces in February, the month of the least baggage traffic.

Sometimes a baggage man will handle 250 trunks in a day. At least John Graham used to be able to do that. Lately, though, he has stepped aside to give the younger fellows a chance. He is not as young as he was, and as a man grows older trunks grow heavier.

The new wardrobe trunks for a while presented a problem to the old baggage handler—"baggage smasher" is an obsolete term, luggage is now handled carefully, with a minimum of damage. During 1928 only one piece of luggage was lost of the million pieces passing through the

Bonaventure Station. Wardrobe trunks, John Graham says, were hard to "roll" until a man got the hand of them. A trunk is "rolled" when it is upended and pivoted on its end once or twice to remove it from the baggage car onto the deck of the baggage van. "Rolling" is largely a matter of balance.

Another reason why the per capita average of baggage has fallen away is that commercial travellers do not carry as many samples with them as they did formerly. The development of printing enables them to take catalogues and pictures instead of duplicate articles. Also, transportation is quicker. People go and return in less time than they used to on short trips and they carry more hand luggage.
