There are now in use nearly six hundred telephones, three hundred and seventy-five being in Charlottetown. Many improvements are to be made, particularly in the way of affording country subscribers the opportunity of talking with nearby settlements etc. The principal lines throughout the country are to be made available for all classes of subscribers and the telephone thus rendered a public convenience. A great deal of new construction has taken place during the year both in town and in the country. Lines have been rebuilt and new toll offices opened, and long distance lines equipped with telephones of the latest pattern, making conversation easy to all parts of the province.
