NEW YORK, Dec. 31—Extreme dullness has marked the trading today. The industrials have been rather soft, both copper and steel selling off from the start fractionally, while the rails have as a rule shown a fairly good tone. This is remarkably so in the case of Southern Pacific, which apparently was bought for the dividend as it sells ex-dividend next Tuesday. The market was a little hardly called for comment, as what changes there were, they were fractional and seemed to be caused by the evening up of traders over the holiday. It was probably this as much as anything else which caused the irregularity. The result was one of the smallest two hours' business of the year. Total sales, \$3,600.

FLEW OVER MOUNTAIN

LOS ANGELES, Cal., December 30.—Arch. Hoxsey of Pasadena, Cal., holder of the world's aeroplane altitude, 11,474 feet, today flew over Mount Wilson, the highest peak of the mountain range that rims the valley in which Los Angeles, Pasadena and the towns of the orange belt lie. Under ideal weather conditions he soared 10,905 feet into the sky and cleared the crest of Mount Wilson with 4,200 feet to spare. Lieutenant Vernon Boller and several other army officers who are here to see the flights, asserted Hoxsey's performance and pointed a new way to transporting armies across mountain ranges. Hoxsey used a Wright bi-plane equipped for passenger service, and made the journey from the field to a point beyond the mountains in one hour and twenty-eight minutes.

(Continued from page one.) drug is approximately fixed by the testimony of Dr. Austin Flint, retained for Robin by Wm. Travers Jerome, his counsel; Dr. Louise Robinovitch, his sister, and the two detectives from the district-attorney's office who rode with him from his sister's house to the criminal courts building. Dr. Flint told the court that as nearly as he could judge from the symptoms the poison had been in Robin's system about three-quarters of an hour, when he collapsed. The two detectives were positive that their prisoner had swallowed nothing on the way to court.

AN INQUEST ASKED FOR

SYDNEY, Dec. 30.—In the opinion of those who have heard of the case, an inquest should have been ordered into the death of a Ward V. woman, who died in Brooklands Hospital on Sunday, Christmas Day. The case seems to have been attended by inhuman brutality on the part of the relatives of the woman. On Sunday a doctor was called to the Fraser home in Ward Five by some of the neighbors. When he arrived he found the woman, dying, with her four-hours-old child dead in the bed beside her. The woman's husband, and also her father, were lying speechlessly drunk at the end of a Christmas orgie. No person else had been in the house during the woman's sufferings until a neighbor happened along. The doctor ordered the woman's removal to the hospital. She died there shortly after her arrival. The matter is to be brought to the attention of the crown prosecutor, with a request that he order an inquest.
